Our first of our fall 2015 **MPC Online Faculty Coffee & Conversation** sessions will take place this **Friday, August 28th from 11:00 a.m. - noon** in **LTC 317**.

This session serves as a follow-up to the MPC Flex Day presentation on Engaging & Retaining Online Students as well as a bridge to the remainder of our fall 2015 Coffee & Conversation sessions.

Since this first gathering falls at the end of the first week of the semester, we will take the opportunity to help you implement the strategies presented at Flex Day. 1. During this session we will explore a variety of topics that will help us work toward mastering our objectives which are to:
2. Identify MPC Online tools that can be used to monitor student participation and progress in your course.
3. Implement one or more strategies for monitoring student participation and progress in your own MPC Online course.
4. Use MPC Online tools to identify students who are participating and those who are at-risk for not succeeding.
5. Use MPC Online communication tools to intervene by encouraging students lagging behind to catch up and recognizing those who are engaged.
6. Identify other strategies for encouraging online students to remain engaged in your online course.

WORDS FROM ARTIST LINDSEY DUNNAGAN:

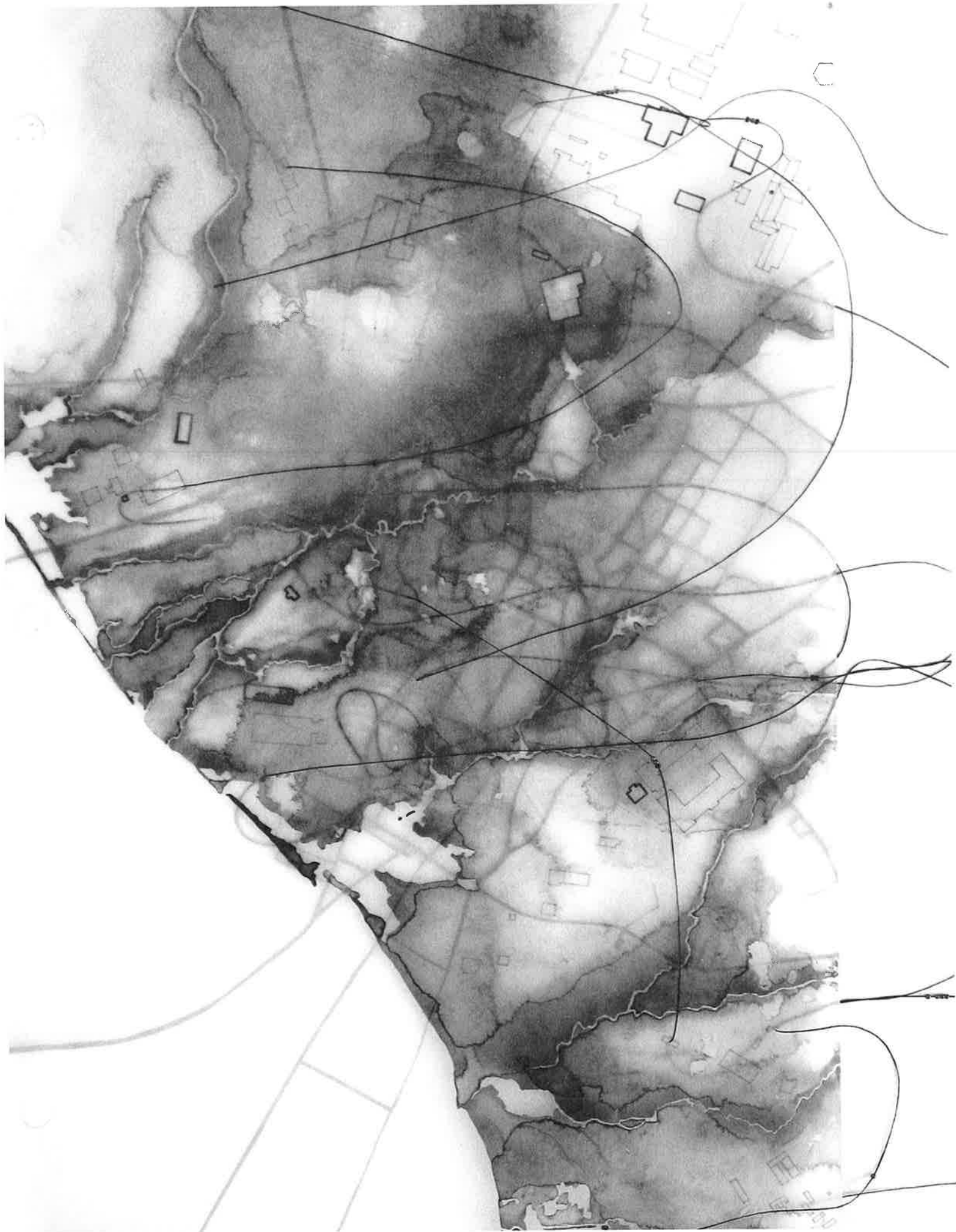
Notions of interconnection, place, and identity over time are explored in the series Alchemist of Memory. Watercolor mixed with salt allows for a nebulous space, where color collides and unexpected patterns form. These spaces of freedom represent the unpredictable nature of people and life situations. Juxtaposed against these ambiguous areas, detailed maps of important places bring clarity and control. These locations are significant to my identity and provide a way to navigate what is unknown. Maps are blown up and shrunk down to focus on small areas like a market or neighborhood and then zoomed out to see the outline of city walls; they are turned on an axis and then reconnected, where lines meet organically. Because these maps are a combination of actual places and false connections, they serve as an atlas of memory that informs identity.

When these memory maps are created in layered paint, a translucency is allowed that mimics the passing of time through locations. Similar to memory, certain areas are clear while others hazy; Moments and people from the past are either prominent or fade away. Aerial views of important neighborhoods and other locations are preserved, while images deep in the watercolor are less easy to decipher. This process illustrates how events from long ago, though hard to remember, still live in the subconscious and contribute to identity.

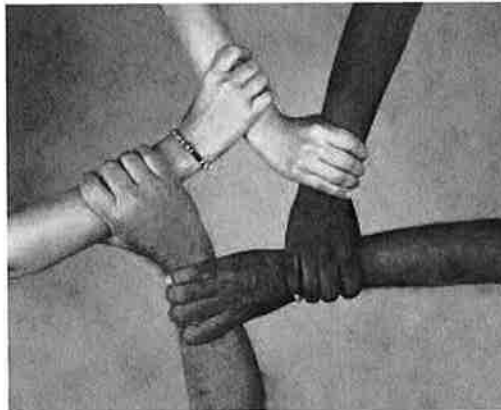

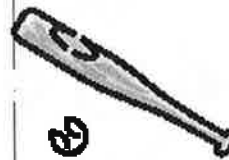

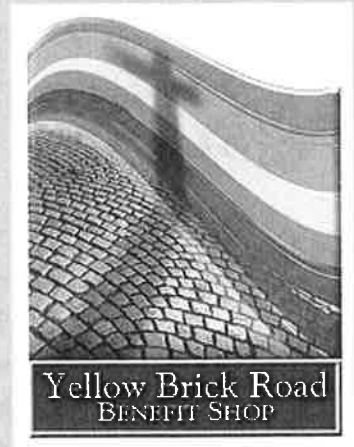

Presidential Proclamation: Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance, 2015

PATRIOT DAY AND NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE AND REMEMBRANCE, 2015

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

On September 11, 2001, America experienced the worst terrorist attack in her history when nearly 3,000 men, women, and children were taken from us, leaving their families and our Nation with a void that can never be filled. But those who brought hate to our shores and smoke to our skies did not expect our country to emerge stronger, and our beacons of hope and freedom to shine brighter as a result. In the years since, we have stood strong as one people -- determined to further embolden our country's character with acts of endurance and strength; rebuilding and resilience; renewal and progress. In remembrance of the innocent victims who lost their lives and in honor of the families they left behind, let us continue to answer these heinous acts by serving our communities, lifting the lives of our fellow citizens, and spreading the hope that others tried to dim that day.

The compassion that rose in the hearts and minds of the American people on September 11 still serves as the ultimate rebuke to the evil of those who attacked us. First responders who risked and gave their lives to rescue others demonstrated the unwavering heroism that defines our great Nation. Volunteers donated time, money, and blood to ensure wounds gave way to healing and recovery. Young people, raised until then in a time of peace, stepped forward to serve and defend us, and meet the threats of our time. And people from across our country and the world joined together in the days that followed to stand up and turn toward one another with open arms, making of a tragedy something the terrorists could never abide -- a tribute of hope over fear, and love over hate.

As we reflect on the lives we lost and pay tribute to the families who still live with extraordinary pain, let us resolve to continue embodying the American spirit that no act of terror can ever extinguish. I call on all Americans to observe this National Day of Service and Remembrance with acts of selflessness and charity. In doing so, we prove once again that the power of those who seek to harm and to destroy is never greater than our power to persevere and to build. I encourage everyone to visit www.Serve.gov to learn of the many opportunities available to give back to others and to reaffirm the fundamental truth that we are our brothers' and our sisters' keepers, and that we can forge a brighter future together.

Today, we continue our unfaltering march forward, enduring in the perennial optimism that drives us and brightening the light that the darkness of evil can never overcome. We remember and yearn for the presence of the beautiful lives lost, and we recommit to honoring their memories by shaping the days to come -- in as stark a contrast as possible to those who took them from us -- with courage, liberty, and love.

By a joint resolution approved December 18, 2001 (Public Law 107-89), the Congress has designated September 11 of each year as "Patriot Day," and by Public Law 111-13, approved April 21, 2009, the

Congress has requested the observance of September 11 as an annually recognized "National Day of Service and Remembrance."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim September 11, 2015, as Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance. I call upon all departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the United States to display the flag of the United States at half-staff on Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance in honor of the individuals who lost their lives on September 11, 2001. I invite the Governors of the United States and its Territories and interested organizations and individuals to join in this observance. I call upon the people of the United States to participate in community service in honor of those our Nation lost, to observe this day with appropriate ceremonies and activities, including remembrance services, and to observe a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time to honor the innocent victims who perished as a result of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

tenth day of September, in the year of our Lord two thousand fifteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and fortieth.

MPC looks to bounce back

Editor's note: The Herald will be previewing a local high school football team and the two local junior college teams each day until the start of the season. Monterey >> There are parts to work with as the Monterey Peninsula College football team attempts to erase two years of disappointment.

North Salinas High graduate Jacob Robante brought life back into a doormat ground game last season, rushing for nearly 800 yards in the team's final six games, while leading the Lobos in touchdowns.

It certainly doesn't hurt having sophomore quarterback Keon Marsh back in the fold. Last season he threw for nearly 2,700 yards and 18 touchdowns for MPC.

Salinas graduate Jordan Torres is a threat out of the backfield and in the slot for MPC, having caught two touchdown passes last season in limited duty.

The Lobos have their top two leading tacklers back from last year, including Seaside graduate Matthew Lualemana, who finished with a team-high 72 tackles.

The defensive front got stronger with the addition of 2011 Alvarez graduate Anthony McKay, who has returned to football this fall after a four-year absence.

During his senior year at Alvarez, the 270-pound defensive tackle had 13 sacks and was named The Herald's Player of the Year. Greenfield graduate Roger Pacheco also is part of the linebacking corps.

In coach Mike Rasmussen's system, MPC is going to score points. He has a history of developing quarterbacks — David Fales and Brian Reader come to mind.

But the Lobos have to get better on defense if they want to contend for supremacy in a conference that got deeper last year with the new arrivals.

Allowing 38 points a game puts too much pressure on the offense. That often leads to turnovers. Last year MPC was minus-eight in turnover ratio.

Panthers, MPC are both home Saturday

Both rallied for season-opening football victories

Football teams from Monterey Peninsula College and Hartnell College will make triumphant returns to their home turf this weekend, each having won their season openers Saturday on the road.

Hartnell, which beat Yuba City 30-25, has a 1 p.m. kickoff Saturday at Rabobank Stadium in Salinas against College of the Redwoods (Eureka) — the team MPC conquered 49-28 in last week's nonconference debut.

Meanwhile, MPC — which scored 35 points in the fourth quarter against Redwoods — will try to keep its mojo going with a 6 p.m. start against Los Medanos, a team looking to rebound from a 44-15 opening-day setback against Merced.

With 40 new players this year, the Panthers didn't crack top 25 in the coaches' preseason rankings, despite a 9-2 record a year ago, but a second-straight win this week could change that.

Hartnell trailed 19-16 at halftime at Yuba, but limited the 49ers to one second-half touchdown, rallying to the win with a 2-yard TD run by Coleman Blackston in the third quarter, and a 7-yard pass from quarterback Justyn Gutierrez (22-for-43, 288 yards) to Eppy Henrigues (eight catches, 70 yards) with 14:46 remaining.

The connection with Henrigues was the third touchdown pass of the game for Gutierrez (who was intercepted once). The other two went to Ronnie Turner (five catches, 120 yards), who caught a 9-yarder in the first quarter, then scored from 70 yards away with 37 seconds left in the same quarter.

Remarkably, that strike was only the second-longest play of the game for Hartnell, which got its other TD from Michael Resendiz, who returned a blocked PAT 90 yards (a 2-point score for the Panthers) early in the second quarter.

Despite the successful start, Hartnell coach Matt Collins sees the typical early-season flaws in need of repair, and is keeping his enthusiasm in check.

"I think we had your typical first-week jitters and mistakes, and we needed to get through that first half to settle down," he said. "It all starts with alignments and assignments, and I think watching the film on Sunday and Monday allowed us to address a lot of those issues.

"But I liked the way our kids handled the adversity of a road trip, and with 40-plus new faces on our roster — players who aren't accustomed to playing junior college football — I think they responded to that stuff pretty well," he said.

MPC trailed Redwoods 21-7 at halftime, and 28-14 going into the fourth quarter — then woke up in frightening fashion.

The Lobos rallied to victory with five offensive touchdowns in the final 12 minutes, four on touchdown passes by quarterback Keon Marsh (26-for-38, 347 yards).

Marsh began the comeback with a six-play, 60-yard drive, culminating with a 9-yard pass to Alloney Burris. He also connected with Jordan Torres from 5 yards away, Joe McNeilly from 7 and Jelahnny Garnett from 9. Torres tallied MPC's final TD on a 9-yard run.

Wide receiver Brandon Sampson, meanwhile, amassed more all-purpose yards Saturday than any other player in the state — 276 — combining 163 on receptions with 107 on returns and 6 yards rushing.
