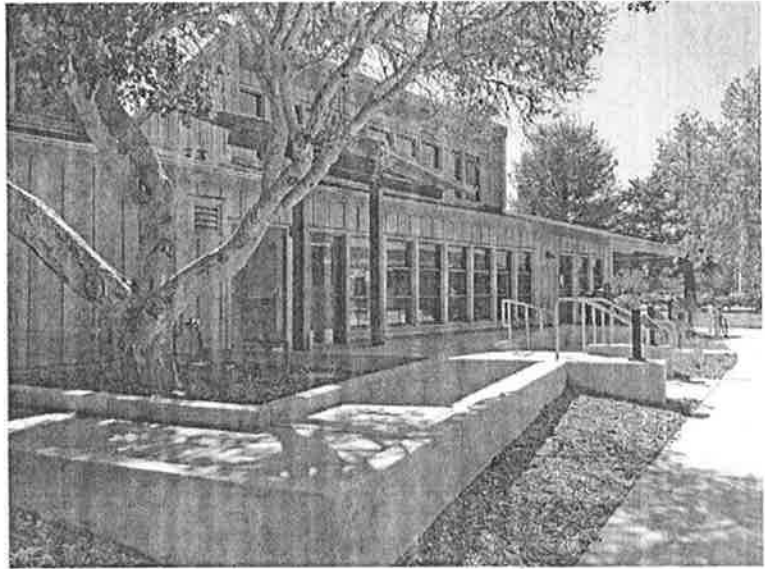

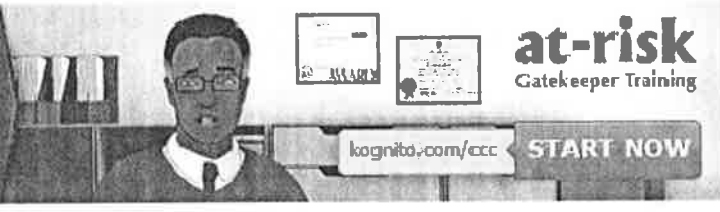

Program Description: Art With Impact hosts short film screenings and discussions at colleges and universities around the United States to reduce the stigma of mental illness and encourage early intervention.

What to Expect:

- Lunch (pizza or sandwiches, chips, etc.).
- Define terms – a guided discussion between the students to open direct dialogue about mental illness, stigma and media’s role in our perceptions.
- Watch and discuss short films – taken from Art With Impact’s library of films, each short is less than five minutes and deals with a particular aspect of mental health. Students discuss in both small and large groups, exploring emotions and thoughts.
- Panel discussion – with resources local to the campus, including a counselor, student, and other community resources, such as county and/or state representatives.

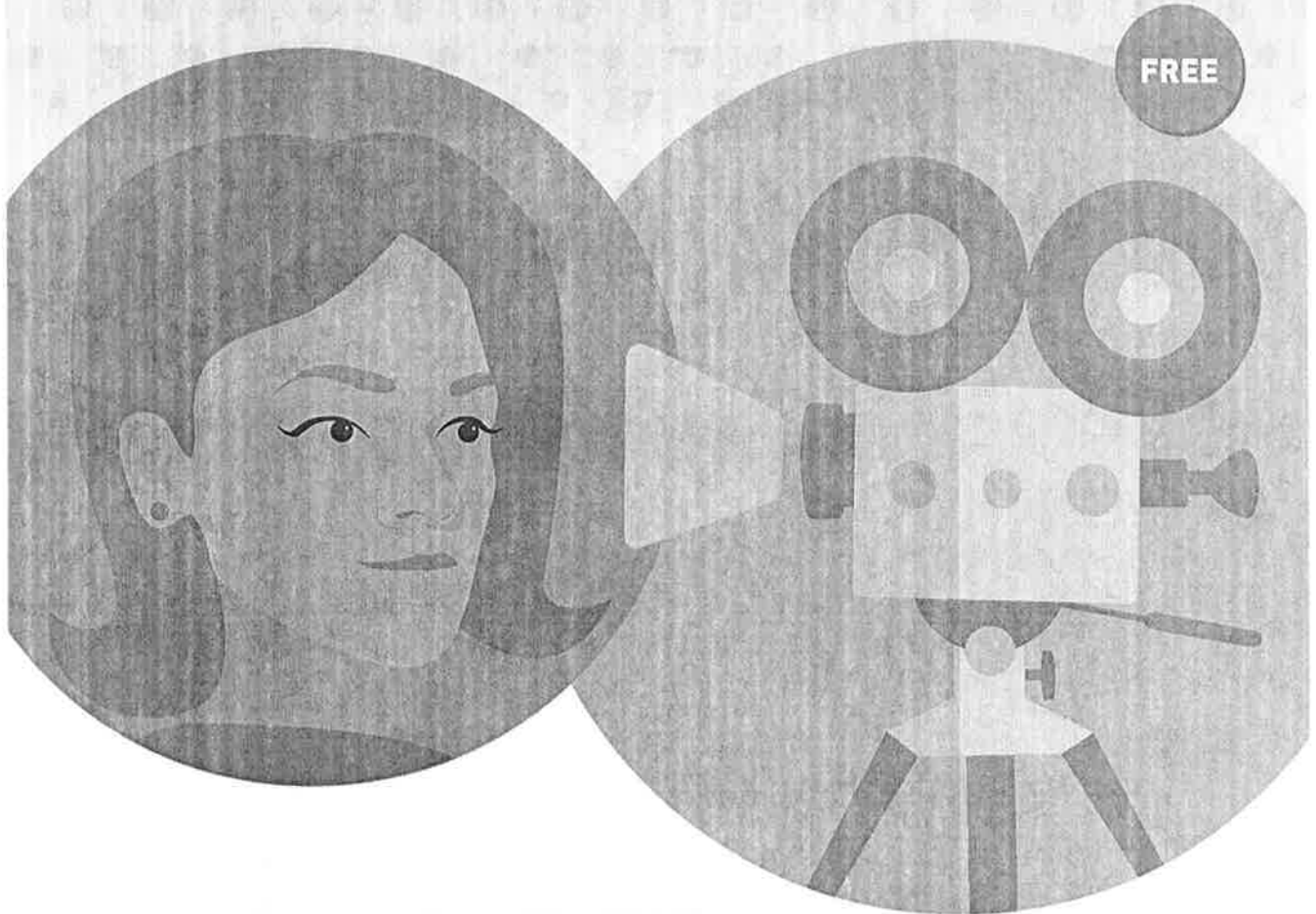

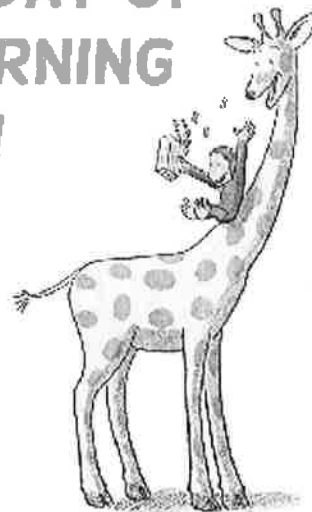

Presidential Proclamation: Honoring the Victims of the Tragedy in Roseburg, Oregon

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

As a mark of respect for the victims of gun violence perpetrated on October 1, 2015, in Roseburg, Oregon, by the authority vested in me as President of the United States by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, I hereby order that the flag of the United States shall be flown at half-staff at the White House and upon all public buildings and grounds, at all military posts and naval stations, and on all naval vessels of the Federal Government in the District of Columbia and throughout the United States and its Territories and possessions until sunset, October 6, 2015. I also direct that the flag shall be flown at half-staff

for the same length of time at all United States embassies, legations, consular offices, and other facilities abroad, including all military facilities and naval vessels and stations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this

second day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand fifteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and fortieth.

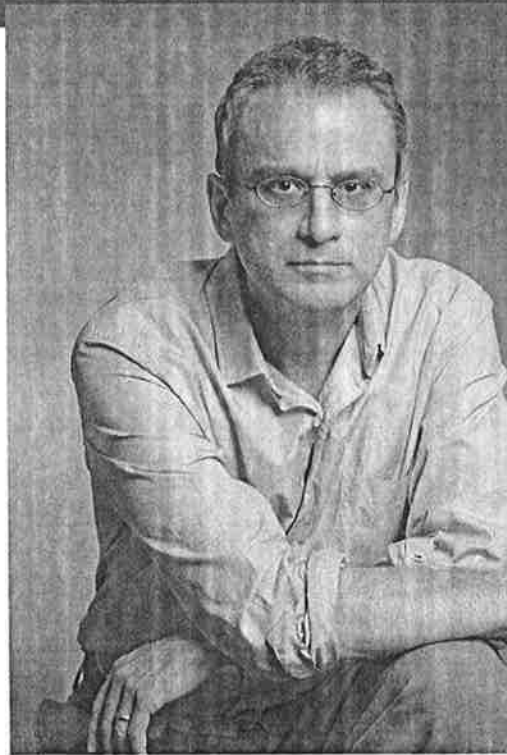

BRAD ORSBURN, MFA, inventive artist and thinker, executes his imaginative pieces in a wide range of mixed media, from lathe-turned, burned wood to semi-transparent colored resin, to brilliantly colored chalk on heavy paper---even inner tubes! His current body of work whirls with tightly controlled revolutions of humming circular motion, suggesting wheels, spinning tops, spheres, active toys, liquid and molten substances. The exhibit features both his three-dimensional floor and wall sculptures and his vibrant, passionate drawings.

He tells us, " *While posing the notion of movement, I find that an inherent grace and subtle humor often surfaces in these pieces. Most recently my work is focused on the multiple. I fashion ill-defined shapes on the wood lathe and apply a fine finish of conversion varnish. At this stage they are individual fetish objects in and of themselves. I call these objects "master shapes" from which a mold is made. The next stage is to cast the objects in colored resins, and then place them back on the lathe for further transformation. These shapes are often subjected to additional manipulation off the wood lathe, then joined in assemblages and displayed as a family. From this familial grouping a dialogue is born. What starts as singular, is cloned, multiplied and compounded into a multi-faceted discourse.*"

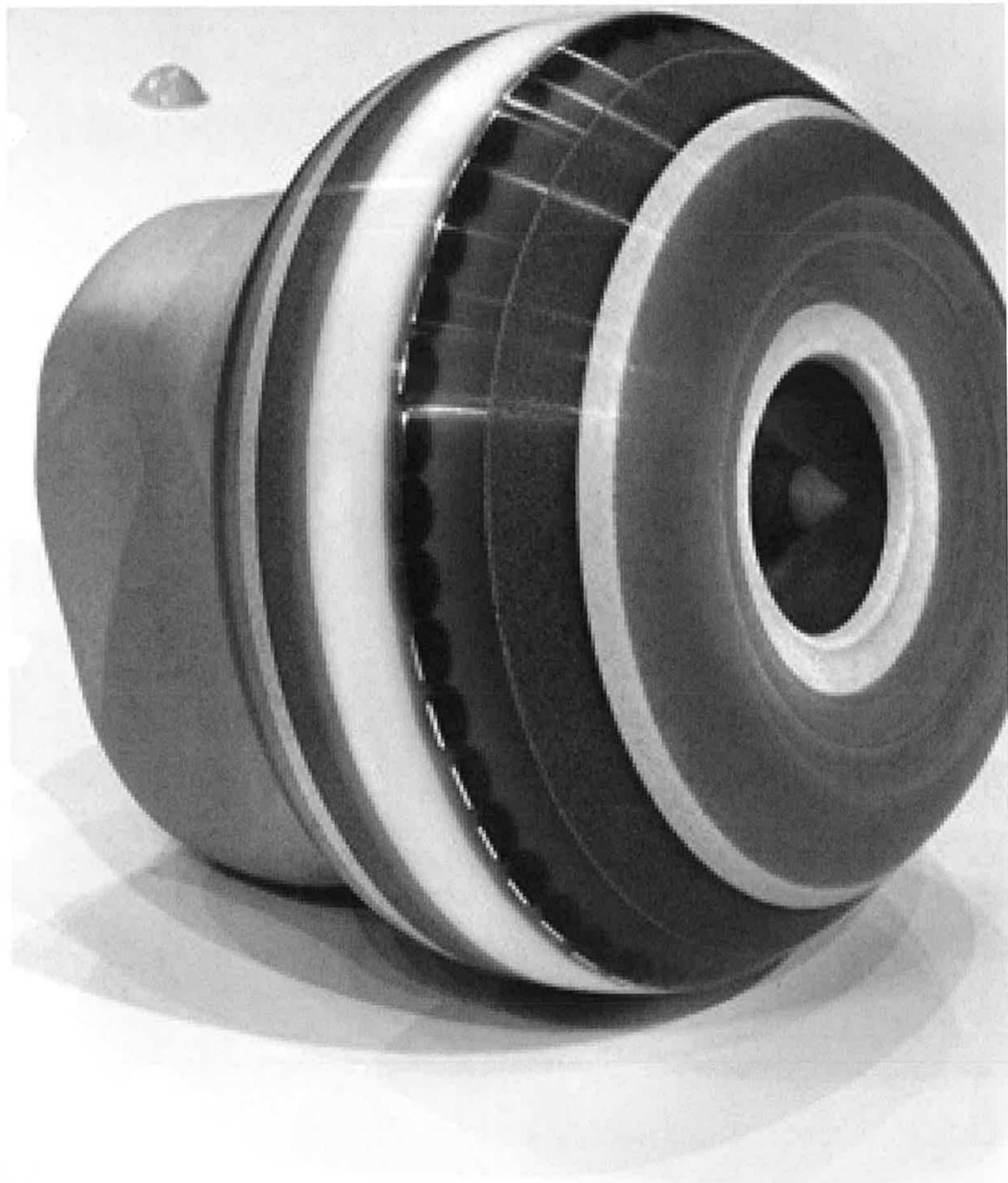

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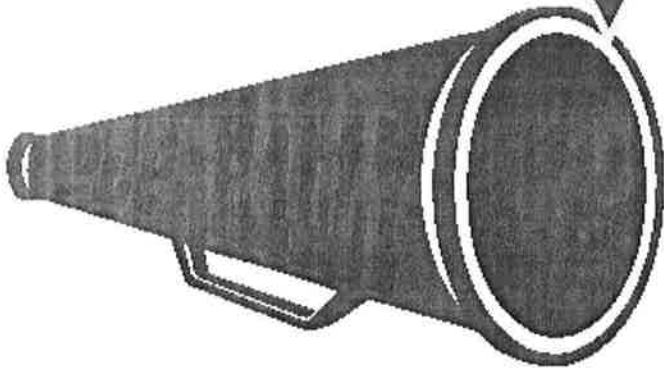

In these times of campus tragedies, MPC will continue to act on credible threats in an effort to enhance the safety of our MPC family.

Please know that the MPD searched the offices in the BMC as well as the classrooms and other spaces. Should any of you find that the light to your office was left on or some object is not in its usual place, that is likely due to impact of searching rooms. I regret any inconvenience this incident has caused and wish you all well.

Reminder: Thursday, Oct 15th is the annual **California ShakeOut**. MPC will again conduct a “desk top” drill to test its emergency communications between the BRT (Building Response Team) and the EOC (Emergency Operations Center). The drill will be held between 10:00 a.m. and 10:50 a.m.

The Plan:

- 1) **Thursday, Oct 15th, 10:15 a.m.** – EOC members will report to the Large Admin Conf. Rm.
- 2) **10:20 – 10:25 – Announcement of Drill is made and EOC is activated** using the ***Informacast System*** which sends broadcasts through our *phone system and classroom speaker system/wall clocks.* **Alertus** using networked computers, (not all computers yet), will send a banner-type message, and the text alert system will use texts and e-mail using EVERBRIDGE (click on this live link to opt in).
- 3) **Following the announcement, BRT members contact the EOC** at one of the Call In Numbers listed below to report on their situation (severity), and provide their name and contact information. **Non-BRT members should become familiar with who their BRT members are.**
- 4) EOC members will track the incoming and collect information to act upon if necessary.
- 5) **10:50 (approx.), the drill will be concluded and the EOC will broadcast an “All Clear” declaring its deactivation.**

EOC members will conduct a debriefing of the exercise to identify where improvements are needed. These recurring drills continue to be an excellent tool in keeping emergency preparedness fresh in our mind and to test communication tools designed for use in emergencies.

To: All Employees

With the upcoming elections, it is important that all employees comply with Monterey Peninsula Community College District Board Policy 5040(1) and State law regarding the use of District resources in connection with election issues.

Monterey Peninsula Community College District Board Policy 5040(1) provides that:

The Governing Board recognizes the right of any employee to take or refrain from taking a stand on a political issue and to support or oppose any issue or candidate. Such activities, however, must be conducted on the employee's own time and he/she must not use materials, equipment, telephones, or clerical time furnished by the District. Employees will exercise reasonable care to show that they are acting in their capacity as private citizens.

California Education Code Section 7054 provides that:

(a) No school district or community college district funds, services, supplies, or equipment shall be used for the purpose of urging the support or defeat of any ballot measure or candidate, including, but not limited to, any candidate for election to the governing board of the district.

(b) Nothing in this section shall prohibit the use of any of the public resources described in subdivision (a) to provide information to the public about the possible effects of any bond issue or other ballot measure if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The informational activities are otherwise authorized by the Constitution or laws of this state.

(2) The information provided constitutes a fair and impartial presentation of relevant facts to aid the electorate in reaching an informed judgment regarding the bond issue or ballot measure.

(c) A violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor or felony

punishable by imprisonment in a county jail not exceeding one year or by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by both, or imprisonment pursuant to subdivision (h) of Section 1170 of the Penal Code for 16 months, or two or three years.

Additionally, Section 8314 of the California Government Code provides in part that

- (a) It is unlawful for...any state or local appointee, employee, or consultant, to use or permit others to use public resources for a campaign activity, or personal or other purposes which are not authorized by law.

...

In this context, "public resources" means any property or asset owned by the state or any local agency, including, but not limited to, land, buildings, facilities, funds, equipment, supplies, telephones, computers, email system, vehicles, travel and state-compensated time. (See Government Code 8314(b)(3)).

Local Roundup: MPC falls to Los Medanos 14-7

A lights-out defensive performance by Monterey Peninsula College wasn't enough to overcome offensive miscues Saturday night as the Lobos fell to the visiting Los Medanos Mustangs 14-7.

Despite an offense that tallied 348 passing yards the previous week, the Lobos (1-1) went the entire night without a single offensive touchdown. The lone MPC score was delivered by the defense.

With the visiting Mustangs (1-1) threatening to score on fourth down at the 14 yard line, the MPC defense stepped it up. Salinas High graduate Elijah Kirkland snagged a tipped pass out of the air and bolted down the sideline 84 yards untouched for a touchdown to put the Lobos up 7-0 late in the first half.

The Lobos forced three red zone turnovers and a fourth-down stand on their own 14 yard line.

"After the first few drives, we were a lot more physical and tackled better," MPC head coach Mike Rasmussen said.

The defense was able to preserve a 7-0 lead heading into halftime.

The Lobos had less success on the other side of the ball as their no-huddle offense struggled to find a rhythm and surrendered six quarterback sacks.

Several promising drives also stalled due to untimely personal foul penalties.

"We have a lot of potential," Rasmussen said. "But we shot ourselves in the foot too many times."

Eventually, the Mustangs' offense was able to find a hole in an otherwise stellar MPC defense. A 32-yard completion placed Los Medanos on the 1 yard line early in the fourth quarter. A quarterback sneak would even the score at 7-7.

The most fatal Lobos mishap occurred on the ensuing drive. Operating from its own 31 yard line, MPC would throw an interception that the Mustangs returned for a touchdown to pull ahead 14-7.

An inspired final drive by the Lobos came to a deflating end as quarterback Keon Marsh was unable to connect with receivers on three straight plays. A sack on fourth-and-long allowed Los Medanos to run out the clock and escape with the victory.

College Notebook: MPC soccer alumnus gets pro arena contract

Former Monterey Peninsula College soccer standout Joseph Cairel will get the opportunity to play the game he loves for money this fall after signing a contract Monday with the Tacoma Stars, who open their first full season as a member of the Major Arena Soccer League on Oct. 24.

Cairel, who led MPC in several statistical categories a year ago, spent the summer competing with the Burlingame Dragons in the Premier Development League, reaching the semifinal round of the 2015 Western Conference playoffs.

That's where he was spotted by Tacoma Stars head coach and general manager Darren Sawatzky, who was coaching the Sounders Under-23, a Seattle-based team that eliminated Burlingame.

"We played this summer down in Tucson with the Sounders U-23s and I was able to see Joseph play in a very competitive game at a high level," Sawatzky said. "He is a tireless worker with an incredible will to win."

The 24-year-old midfielder started 17 of 19 games at MPC last year, scoring 12 goals, with seven assists, and amassing 31 total points — all team highs. He attempted 32 shots, and was credited with 24 shots on goal, a 750 .percentage.

"I am very excited to be a part of the Tacoma Stars organization and its great history," Cairel said. "I'm determined to bring something new to the team this season."

Cairel played 451 minutes in eight games for the Dragons this summer.

Five-year absence from the game hasn't slowed MPC lineman

There were moments when Anthony McKay wondered if he was doing the right thing, spending less time with his two sons and more time on the football field playing a game.

Yet, seeing his 3-year-old and soon-to-be 1-year old in the stands at Monterey Peninsula College during home games is a reminder to McKay why he's back in uniform as a Lobo.

Returning to a game he once dominated at Alvarez High in Salinas five years ago is more about pursuing a college education than physically abusing opponents in the trenches.

"The hardest thing for me is emotionally because I'm putting a strain on my kids for not being there," McKay said. "But I'm doing something to better our future and put us in a better place."

If absence truly makes the heart grow fonder, McKay has rediscovered his passion for football for the Lobos.

"(McKay) didn't travel a straight course," MPC coach Mike Rasmussen said. "We tried to recruit him out of high school. He went in a different direction."

McKay isn't a reclamation project. He isn't a troubled soul. This is more about an athlete who put family before his own desires.

"I had to grow up and mature as a man," the 21-year-old said. "I needed to take care of my son. I had some family issues and was going through a rough time."

There is no playbook for starting a family as an 18-year-old. McKay spent a short time at Hartnell in 2011 before realizing he needed to get his priorities straight.

"My mindset wasn't strong enough to go forward," McKay said. "I felt maybe football wasn't for me anymore."

And for five years it wasn't.

"He wasn't just the best lineman in the county as a senior," said former Alvarez coach Ralph Ward. "I felt he was the best player in the area — period."

While he contemplated a return to the game many times, McKay didn't sense the timing was right — until he walked into Rasmussen's office last winter.

“I told him the reason I’m here is to pursue my education,” McKay said. “I’m going to use football as a vehicle. I want to be a student first. I told coach this is my last shot.”

That’s all Rasmussen needed to hear.

“He finally walked into the door and was very sincere about wanting to go to college,” Rasmussen said.

The next step would be getting back to the form that made McKay one of the more feared defensive linemen in the county as a senior at Alvarez in 2010.

“He hasn’t lost a step,” MPC sophomore inside linebacker and former Seaside standout Matt Lualemana said.

“Our off-season program gets guys ready,” Rasmussen said. “But yeah, you never really know when someone has been away that long until they get back on the field.”

Neither did McKay.

As a senior at Alvarez, McKay sat with a recruiter from Nevada, who told him how much he liked him, only to tell him he wasn’t big enough.

“Yeah, I remember,” the 6-foot-1, 260-pound McKay said. “Other coaches seemed to doubt me as well. What I needed was the right fit.”

Presto.

While it took McKay five years to land on his feet, one meeting with Rasmussen changed his direction.

“It was really motivating talking to him,” McKay said. “I explained to him what I wanted to do. He’s given me an opportunity. I felt at home.”

Regaining his strength and adding speed, McKay has floated around the Lobos’ defensive front line as a tackle and end through the first four games, leading the team in sacks with four.

“He’s made a dramatic change,” Lualemana said. “He’s become a hands-on leader. He’s added more character to our defense. We all look up to him.”

His impact on the defense has been big: he is third on the team in tackles with 22 and recovered a fumble for MPC, who visits Cabrillo on Saturday.

“He’s learning how to elevate his game to the college level,” Rasmussen said. “He’s becoming more fundamental. He has a good tool set and is doing a real good job for us.”

McKay, who bench presses 225 pounds 18 times, has helped revamp an MPC defense that is allowing 18 points a game. Last year the Lobos gave up 33.5 points a game.

“He means a lot to our defense,” said sophomore linebacker Roger Pacheco, a Greenfield High graduate. “He’s a monster in the trenches and our emotional leader.”

Roles that McKay humbly accepts.

“I am emotional,” McKay said. “There are some things I need to improve on and develop quicker feet. It’s all coming back. My strength is there. I just have to stay on the right course.”

That includes juggling his family duties as well as the classroom. Football is just a small sample of his daily routine.

“It’s a blessing,” McKay said. “Everything that I was hoping for and wishing for has worked out. It’s all coming back. It’s something I have to do. I just need to remain humble and optimistic.”

Ward, who is now an assistant football coach at Carmel, does not see that as an issue for his former pupil.

“Not only is he an exceptional athlete, but Anthony is very smart and cerebral,” Ward said. “I’m not surprised at all to hear he’s doing well at MPC. Tell him to keep balling.”

Other than the Lobos’ two losses, McKay couldn’t have asked for a better return to the game. One of the pleasures is talking to his oldest son after each game.

“He will talk about our game for the next two days,” said McKay, a social science major. “He likes to show me how to tackle people. I have a good support system at MPC and at home.”

JC Football: MPC falls 17-9 to West Hills

The chance was there, just 36 inches away, for the Lobos of Monterey Peninsula College, but a misfire between the center and quarterback dashed a golden opportunity Saturday night in a 17-9 loss to West Hills.

The Lobos (2-2) had used a trick play moments earlier to set themselves up for glory — wide receiver Brandon Sampson heaved a 39-yard pass to Alloney Burris on a double-reverse — but they failed to seal the deal by putting the ball on the ground on fourth-and-1.

“I didn’t think their guys really stopped us. I thought we moved the ball the whole night,” said MPC coach Mike Rasmussen. “We got the ball to the 1-yard line and didn’t finish. I’ve got to give credit to (West Hills), but we had many, many opportunities tonight.”

Sampson, a sophomore from Baltimore, helped create many of those chances with a brilliant night at receiver, hauling in 16 passes from two MPC quarterbacks for 189 yards. But he never found the end zone.

MPC broke up a scoreless game just 7 seconds into the second quarter when Maxwell Yeater kicked a 33-yard field goal, points for which the Lobos’ defense deserves plenty of credit.

That field position came thanks to three consecutive plays on which MPC defenders threw West Hills for a loss, including back-to-back sacks by Matthew Lualemana and Adrian Valdez that forced the visitors to punt from their 1-yard line.

MPC co-captain Najee Chamagne returned the kick from the 41 to the 26, and the Lobos got all the way to the 8 before a 10-yard quarterback sack by Elijah Tausaga forced the field goal on the first snap of the second quarter.

More defensive heroics came from MPC linebacker Andrew Jakubowsky, a freshman from Seaside, who derailed West Hills’ next drive with an interception, then recovered a fumble for MPC at the 1-yard line to complete a goal-line stand with 6:53 left in the half.

From there, the Lobos put together a 99-yard drive that included passes of 34 and 32 yards by quarterback Keon Marsh to Sampson, who also contributed an 11-yard run to that march. Marsh also connected with Brian Hunt for 16 yards in the 12-play trek, then carried the ball over the goal line himself from the 1 to give MPC a 9-0 lead. The Lobos missed the point-after kick.

The breathing room didn't last long. West Hills answered on its next possession by moving 69 yards on five plays, the biggest being a 41-yard pass from Cort Groathouse to Jordan Herrera for the touchdown. John Canes, an alumnus of San Benito High, kicked the extra point to cut the margin to 9-7 at halftime.

"I thought our defense played well tonight. We gave up that one big play, but that was it," Rasmussen said. "And our kids played hard to the finish. That's how we're built."

The visitors from Coalinga took command in the second half, ramping up their running game behind Anthony Cross, who carried 19 times for 68 yards after the intermission. The ground attack helped set up a field goal that Canes drilled from 39 yards out, giving his team a 10-9 lead on its first drive of the second half.

The insurance touchdown, a 13-yard pass from Groathouse to Corian Reyes-Thomas, came with 9:03 left in the game, finishing a 69-yard journey that required 13 plays.

The Lobos travel Saturday to play Cabrillo College in a 6 p.m. game at Aptos.
