We have slightly different open days now. WE ARE OPEN MONDAY through THURSDAY, 11:00 am to 4:00 pm.



STEM Capacity-Building Projects

Funding Guidelines

In an effort to promote innovative ideas and support effective planning and program review, the Vice President of Academic Affairs is working with the MPC Foundation to fund projects that build STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) capacity at Monterey Peninsula College.

Specifically, we will consider proposals from MPC faculty or staff that address one or more of the following three priority areas:

- Professional development (must include a dissemination plan);
- Equipment purchases; and
- Articulation/development of Pathways or Programs of Study from High School to College and/or College to University or career.

Proposals should be submitted to the Vice President of Academic Affairs via Leslie Procive by February 29, 2016.

Proposals should be less than three pages long, and should provide a synopsis of your project (including cost estimate). Please address each of the following questions:

- 1. How does your proposal address one of the three priority areas listed above?
- 2. Is your proposal documented in your program review? If so, please include those sections of your program review.
- 3. How does your project contribute to building STEM capacity at MPC?
- 4. If you proposal involves professional development, what is your plan to disseminate the information you learned to the campus/your colleagues?
- 5. If you proposal involves equipment, how will it be used?
- 6. If your proposal involves articulation/developing pathways or programs of study which partners do you propose to work with and how?

Proposals will be reviewed by a committee to include the VPAA, Dean of Instruction, Dean of Instructional Planning, Associate Dean of Instructional Technology and Development, Foundation Executive Director, and two Foundation Board members. Applicants will be notified of the outcome by mid-March.

Requests of up to \$7,000 will be considered. Proposals will be scored based on the degree to which proposed projects connect with the relevant department's program review, build STEM capacity, and involve innovative ideas.



Good Morning Friends and Colleagues,

Flex Day Wrap-Up

First of all I'd like to remind and encourage all of you to take our <u>Spring 2016 Flex Day Survey</u>. As of this writing we have about 75 responses and we'd like to get that up into the triple digits like we often do. Your suggestions last time resulted in changes in the timing of presentations to allow most presenters more time at this flex day. Please keep the suggestions coming.

We have <u>video of all the general sessions</u> posted for your enjoyment and review. On the same page are the powerpoint presentations from all those who responded to my request. If you gave a presentation and you would like your material posted, send it to me and we'll get it up there as well. So go ahead, click the link, and re-live Elias Kary's anthropologic analysis of MPC! Thank you to everybody who worked to make the flex days a success.

Please remember that we have an unusual mid-semester flex day coming up on Thursday April 28. This situation arose because of the way that the Memorial Day holiday fell on a fifth Monday this year, thus impacting the timing of finals week and the graduation ceremony. Recognizing that the Academic Senate organizes the regular flex days, the administration has offered to organize all or part of this one, or collaborate with the Academic Senate on planning. The Academic Senate discussed this briefly on December 4, and will decide how to proceed on February 18. If you have specific ideas on what we should do--or not do--on this day, then please communicate with your Academic Senate representative before our next meeting.

Academic Senate Representative Elections--at-large and adjunct at-large

Each year the Academic Senate holds an election for one of its at-large seats. This year is no exception. The election will be held the last week in February, Feb 22-26. If you would like to step forward for the at-large seat, please let me know. The faculty member who currently holds this seat, Eric Ogata, does not plan to run again, so this seat is wide open. Thank you Eric, for your service over the last few years.

In addition, this year we will be holding an election for our adjunct at-large seat. We do this once every three years. This election will be held concurrently with the other at-large seat. If you are an adjunct who would like to serve on the Academic Senate, please let us know. We all acknowledge that this is basically a volunteer opportunity for our adjunct faculty members and give special recognition to those of you willing to serve. I currently do not know if the faculty member who currently holds this seat, Sunny LeMoine, would like to run again. There are no term limits for Academic Senate representatives.

At our last meeting I asked Sunny for help in reaching out to our adjunct faculty members to let them know about this opportunity. If you have any ideas on how to more effectively reach our adjunct faculty member colleagues, please let us know. And please help spread the word.

On a related note, the Academic Senate will hold its officer elections for 2016-2017 at the second meeting in March. I am pleased to announce that Heather Craig has stepped forward to run for Academic Senate President. I think she'd do a great job; it would be wonderful to have her. The Academic Senate elects officers from among the committee members who will serve during the next academic year. Thank you Heather for stepping it up!

Committee Openings

The Institutional Committee on Distance Education (ICDE) needs a CTE faculty representative. If you can represent the CTE disciplines and would like to serve on the ICDE, please let Heather Craig, chair of our Committee on Committees, know. The ICDE Website indicates they meet Friday mornings 10-12, once a month. We do already have one candidate for this seat, but we wanted to open it up to larger audience to make sure everybody had a chance to speak up.

The Committee on Committees also has an open seat. If you would like to serve on this committee,, the group that makes recommendations to the Academic Senate on faculty committee membership, please let us know. There are currently only two faculty members on this committee.

SLO Plan

The Learning Assessment Committee has worked hard to develop a Plan to Establish Systematic Assessment of Course and Program Outcomes. The plan was developed in recognition that there are some aspects of our current practices that can be improved, and is given a sense of urgency by the ACCJC Notice of Enhanced Monitoring and Possible Special Report that the school received back in August. Our current process is not completely broken. It does, however, contain aspects that are not currently successful or efficient. The LAC wants to spend its time finding ways to improve our assessment practices. It does not want to spend time writing a special report.

The plan seeks to achieve two main goals established by a presidentially convened SLO Group:

- 1. Follow systematic, ongoing cycles for course and program assessment.
- 2. Ensure all scheduled courses are assessed.

The plan includes:

- Professional development opportunities for college personnel involved in course and program assessment
- · Collaboration with AAAG and/or instructional divisions to develop and implement cycles of course assessment that support program assessment and program review cycles

• Collaboration with the Curriculum Advisory Committee to incorporate outcome assessment into the curricular review process

The plan identifies these topics as general areas we need to address, and provides a timeline to try and accomplish the task. We hope that an outcome of carrying out the plan will be an assessment process that is a useful and beneficial exercise for those that engage with it.

The plan has circulated through appropriate portions of the shared governance process. It was endorsed at the Curriculum Advisory Committee on 1/12/16, AGGG on 2/3/16, and the Academic Senate on 2/4/16.

The Learning Assessment Committee will begin the Spring Semester developing ideas of *how* to meet the objectives of the plan.

GE Descriptions

Last year, the Curriculum Advisory Committee brought to our attention that the descriptions of MPC GE areas needed review and potential revision. There were particular problems with MPC GE Area F, intercultural Studies. In collaboration with the CAC, we reviewed and made revisions to that area so that courses under review could be approved to satisfy that particular area. As we became familiar with these GE area descriptions, we realized that the descriptions for many of the other areas needed attention as well. I'll be blunt here. The sample or example outcomes that help describe the criteria for course approval in the Natural Sciences GE area are in serious need of attention. So that's where we are now. We've addressed concerns with Area F, but need to give the rest of the document some scrutiny. We hope to do this over the spring semester.

COOP Task Force

Finally, the Academic Senate recently appointed four faculty members to a President's Task Force on COOP. The charge of this committee is to examine the COOP program in hopes of scaling it up so that it can serve a greater spectrum MPC students and programs. We hope that MPC COOP opportunities will become an integral part of many MPC programs. The faculty members on the task force include Kathleen Clark, Tom Rebold, James Lawrence, and Mary Johnson. We hope they represent a balanced perspective to make recommendations to provide greater and more varied work experience opportunities for MPC students.

If you've made it this far...

As many of you know, I enjoy visiting the Salton Sea down in Imperial County. These are a pair of Burrowing Owls that can easily be seen roosting right next to the road near the sea. These are birds of open country and grasslands that are seeing a dramatic decline in numbers, as are many grasslands birds and mammals. The Cornell Lab of Ornithology says that their preferred habitats are "prairie, pastures, desert or shrub steppe, and airports." If you want to see these owls around here, check out the open grasslands north of Marina and around Elkhorn Slough. They're always fun to see.

MPC 83, Hartnell 69: Lobos pounce on Panthers to stay hot By John Devine

A rash of injuries has left the Monterey Peninsula College men's basketball team with just eight healthy bodies. But the Lobos might just be playing their best ball of the season right now.

"We grind," MPC sophomore Isaiah Brown said. "We're a hardworking blue-collar group."

The Lobos used a 17-2 run in the first half Wednesday, outworking rival Hartnell for a 83-69 win.

With the win, MPC has won four out of its last five Coast Conference games, keeping its postseason hopes alive at 14-8 overall.

"For me, each game at this point is a must win if we want to get to the playoffs," Brown said.

The 6-foot-5 forward played like it with 18 points and 15 rebounds for MPC, which sits two games behind unbeaten Cabrillo (6-0) in the Coast Conference.

"When your number is called, you have to know your role," former Seaside High guard Chris Evans said. "You cannot get complacent when you don't have a full roster."

A roster that finished the game with five players after two fouled out late in the second half.

The Lobos, who came into the game averaging 76.2 points, produced 49 points in the second half as Brown led four players in double figures with his 10th double-double of the season.

"We're aggressive," Brown said. "We're going to push. Each man has to be accountable on the court. We're not going to change our style. We're defensive minded first."

That was evident in the first half when the Lobos erased an early 9-2 deficit, keeping the state's No. 5 leading scorer for Hartnell in Riley Knowles scoreless in the first eight minutes.

"Our defense is creating baskets in transition," said Evans, who finished with 12 points for MPC.

It also held Knowles, who came into the game averaging 23 points a night, to 13 points, and Hyram Miskin, the Panthers' second leading scorer, to two free throws.

"We have jelled on defense," Brown said.

Twice in the first half the Lobos went on runs of 10 or more points to build a 10-point cushion, extending it to as much as 22 in the second half.

MPC attacked the basket all night. The result sent to the Lobos to the foul line 29 times, where they knocked down 21.

"We're fast and we get to the rack," Evans said. "If we can get to the paint for a basket, that's better than taking jump shots."

The two teams, who will face each other again in the second half of the season, were meeting for the second time this year as MPC beat Hartnell 77-71 in a tournament on Dec. 18.

The Panthers, who won just four games all of last year, have more than doubled that with 10 this year behind Knowles.

MPC made a conscious effort to contain the high-scoring guard, who had 21 points in the first meeting.

With a depleted presence in the paint, the Lobos have turned to DJ Johnson for minutes. The freshman has scored 26 points in his last two games after averaging 3.6 in his first 20.

"We have seven of the greatest guys," Brown said.

A depleted roster has also forced the Lobos to play smart without losing their aggressiveness.

Once MPC seized the momentum, it increased the tempo as the Seaside connection of Evans and Kyle Hieb combined for nine points during its 17-2 run.

Each time the Panthers attempted to get back in the game in the second half, MPC had an answer.

When Jesus Salinas came off the bench to knock down a pair of 3-point goals for Hartnell, the Lobos shut him down the rest of the game. Hieb also had two big blocks in the second half.

When Brown wasn't flying to the basket for a dunk, Isaac Clark — 15 points — was, with a pair of two-handed dunks. Clark finished with 15 points, coming into the game averaging a teamleading 17.2 points a game.
