MPC Foundation Board Designated Fund for Faculty and Staff Advancement Awards The MPC Foundation Board Designated Fund for Faculty and Staff Advancement Awards provides for projects by MPC faculty and staff members designed to enhance their effectiveness in the classroom and on campus.

George J. (Bob) Faul Academic Excellence Grant Awards

The term Academic Excellence is defined as any project which significantly enriches the quality of the overall learning experience at MPC. It assumes projects and program activities which are beyond the sources of public funding. The MPC Foundation awards George J. (Bob) Faul Academic Excellence Grants to MPC faculty members in three areas:

- 1. Faculty Professional Development Grants are awarded to increase faculty knowledge, skills, and research which will, in turn, enhance the curriculum.
- 2. **Research and Competition Grants** are awarded for activities which enhance student performance beyond the instructional standards available in a particular course or curriculum.

 - o Increase the knowledge, skills of full-time staff, or

- Applications must be typed and submitted on forms provided by the MPC Foundation.
- There are two grant cycles each year: one in the spring semester and one in the fall semester.
- Grant applications are reviewed by the MPC Foundation's Faculty and Staff Advancement Committee and then submitted to the Foundation's Executive Committee and Board of Directors for final approval.
- Grants not redeemed (including the signing of the award agreement letters) will be rescinded after 60 days without prior approval by MPC Foundation staff.
- Grantees are required to use the funds for the purposes awarded or return the funds to the Foundation within six months of the grant.

- A final report must be completed by the Grantee and returned to the MPC Foundation within six months of the grant.
- Grantee will not be eligible for another grant until a final report for the grant is completed.







For me it is payback time. I devote my life to improving and financially supporting our public education system and urging others to do so. Please



Escaping the shadow of his brother could not come by continuing to be teammates — not when Austin and David Fales play the same position.

Austin Fales realized it was time to make a name for

himself.

"Definitely," said Austin, who quarterbacked Palma to a Tri-County Athletic League title last year. "I was not going to sit behind him again."

So when his brother David transferred back to Monterey Peninsula College after a year at Nevada, Austin enrolled at rival Hartnell

College.

"Austin wanted a chance to play," said their mother Tayna Fales. "He's been following David's footsteps for many years." Both will get a shot this season to lead their respective teams while living in the same house and sharing the same bedroom.

"I felt coming to Hartnell, I could step in and be a stable quarterback for them," Austin said. "Hartnell gives me the opportunity to create my own identity."

A year after David threw for over 2,000 yards and 20 touchdowns for Palma, Austin followed the script throwing for over 1,500 yards and tossing just five

interceptions in 172 attempts.

"We are similar in our styles," David said. "We practice the same. I'd say he's not afraid to make plays with his feet. But I don't know where people thought he was quicker. I don't want to say I've got the better arm, but ..."

While MPC's pro-style offense is similar to what David ran at Palma, Austin is learning the spread, which means he'll be in the shotgun a majority of the time.

"What I'm being told is we could throw the ball 50

times," Austin said. "As a quarterback, who wouldn't be excited about that?"

Austin's decision to go in another direction did not dampen his relationship with his brother. The pair practiced together all summer, just like they have the last five years with the Central Coast Elite Quarterback Academy, offering constructive criticism.

"There's never been a time when we're not competing against each other," Austin said "If I tell him I had a

really good practice, he'll say he had a better one. As much as we hate on each other, we still look out for each other."

The living quarters isn't the only thing that hasn't changed since the pair played together at Palma. They both have the competitive drive to outperform the other

"We've had this thing going for a while," David said. "Anything we do is competition. It's fun. But it's serious. Now we're rivals."

"It's healthy competition," said their mother. "They would never admit it, but this has been hard on them. They are both their biggest supporters."

Hartnell-MPC is still among the best rivalries in junior college sports as both schools recruit the same athletes. The two teams will

meet in the season finale on Nov. 13 at MPC.

"It will feel weird seeing him on the other sideline," Austin said. "But I have been waiting for this for so long to play against him. One of us has to win. I told David I want him to go 9-1 this year."

The jabbing about who has the better team has already heated up. Hartnell shared the Coast Conference title last year, while MPC was 10-0 two years ago when another former Palma product, Brian Reeder, was the quarterback.

"Talking to Brian and seeing his success played a part in my decision to come back," David said. "I've known coach Rasmussen for a while. He told me I could come in and compete. This offense really suits me."

What both quarterbacks bring to their respective teams is accuracy while limiting their mistakes. Both completed over 60 percent of their passes as seniors at Palma.

David's reasons for giving up a scholarship to Nevada and returning home were simple. The offense at Nevada just didn't fit his talents as a pocket passer.

"It wasn't my style," David said "Nevada is a great

program and it was a good experience. I just felt it wasn't the best situation for me. I think Nevada agreed. In the long run, transferring would be good for me."

Having not played in a game for more than a year, David has spent the summer trying to get the rust off. But you can't emulate game-type situations in practice.

"I'm anxious, nervous and excited," David said. "But I'm still competing for a starting job with the guy that was here last year. I can't wait to take that first snap in a game, or make that first pass."

In an effort to get a jumpstart on his collegiate career, Austin joined the Panthers for spring ball last year.

"I'm still competing for a job," Austin said. "There's a lot to learn in coach Collins' system. But I feel good at where I'm at."

While their decisions won't divide the family's loyalty until Nov. 13, it does put a strain on mom, who has never missed a game her sons have played in.

"I don't know what I'm going to do," said Tayna. "It kind of makes me sad. I guess that's one reason I haven't looked at either's schedule. I guess I'll have to buy an MPC and Hartnell shirt and sew them together."

You're Footing the Bill: College President Salaries

CENTRAL COAST, Calif.- Everyone has been hearing about the state cuts to higher education over the last few years, and local community colleges and universities are no exception, but you may be surprised to hear that the college presidents are still making well over a six-figure salary.

First, the president salaries for the community colleges on the Central Coast: At Hartnell College in Salinas, President Phoebe Knight Helm makes the least of all three. Her base salary is \$180,000 a year. She gets no health benefits, but does get \$48,000 a year for living expenses.

Next, Dr. Brian King is the president of Cabrillo College in Aptos, the majority of students who attend are from Santa Cruz County. King makes \$227,772 per year and gets over \$20,000 in benefits.

Monterey Peninsula College has the fewest students, but its president makes the most money. Dr. Douglas Garrisson makes \$245,000 per year and gets an extra \$16,811 in benefits.

Incase you're wondering about the two four year universities on the Central Coast, UCSC's chancellor George Blumenthal makes \$318,916 per year and Cal State Monterey Bay's president Dianne Harrison makes \$270,315 per year.



Rasmussen set for 10th year as MPC football coach

This season marks the 10th anniversary as coach of the Monterey Peninsula College Lobos for Mike Rasmussen.

During that time he has taken the Lobos to their first perfect season in school history (2008), a pair of 9-1 campaigns (2004, 2006), one 8-2 finish (2007) and three bowl appearances (2004, 2006, 2008).

Rasmussen's overall record at MPC is 53-40. But during the last six years he's 47-16.

Seven of those losses came last season when MPC had its first losing record in six years, finishing 3-

"It wasn't any one thing," Rasmussen said about the 2009 season. "We fell short and made mistakes. It was a number of things."

Mostly, it might have been the price a community college team has to pay for a perfect season, where rosters can change dramatically from one year to the next.

The Lobos came within two points of the ultimate perfect season in 2008.

After going 10-0 in the regular season, the Lobos lost to Shasta, 33-31, in the Bulldog Bowl in San Mateo.

There are enough encouraging signs about 2010 to believe the Lobos' slump will be brief.

Dan Connors, a 6-5, 225-pounder from Pacific Grove High returns at quarterback where he will compete with David Fales, who had a sensational 2008 for Palma.

That year he completed 117 of 166 passes for 1,864 yards and 19 touchdowns during the regular season. He threw only three interceptions.

Fales comes to MPC after spending one year at the

University of Nevada.

Whoever is the quarterback will likely use Bret Chernetsky as a primary receiver. Chernetsky was Fales' favorite receiver in high school.

During that 2008 year Chernetsky caught 48 passes from Fales for 853 yards and 13 touchdowns.

He led MPC in catches last year with more than 50 for nearly 700 yards.

The ground attack will be aided by Markeen Williams, the MBL rushing champion in 2008 from Monterey High with 1,202 yards and county leader in rushing touchdowns with 17.

The offensive line will be built mostly with Salinas Valley players such as 6-4, 300-pound Ricky Amador from Gonzales; 6-4, 290-pound Max Lohr from Pacific Grove; 6-2, 230-pound David Winslow from Palma; 6-2, 280-pound Martin Mendez from King City and 6-5, 280-pound Terry Poole from the Salinas area.

Newcomers on defense include linebacker David Williams from Seaside, Kelly Swanston from Palma and Alex Huitzil from King City.

Jarod Sloan from Salinas High is one of the defensive backs along with Chris Nyugen of Seaside and David Santos of Palma.

"We have a lot of potential, a good attitude and work ethic," said Rasmussen.

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Peter Funt: Many colleges fail to follow book rules

Just as parents try to get over the shock of this year's college tuition rates, the bills start piling up for peripherals—everything from desk lamps to laundry. So here's a question regarding one of higher education's most exorbitant non-tuition items: Why does a collegiate paperback such as "Vice and Virtue in Everyday Life" cost \$133.95?

The book, subtitled "Introductory Readings in Ethics," is in its eighth edition and remains a favorite in college ethics classes. It's a 544-page paperback, certainly a hefty tome, but vastly overpriced for all markets except college, where predatory publishers, careless instructors and lax administrators combine to deliver a wallop to the wallet.

College book prices, which can easily exceed \$1,000 a year, have been climbing at roughly 6 percent annually. One response, made easier by the Internet, is the burgeoning market for used books. Used books now account for about \$2 billion of the \$5 billion total spent by American college students. But, since publishers don't get any of the revenue from used books, their natural response is to raise prices on new books even higher.

In 2008 Congress took a look at this problem, and the result was the Higher Education Opportunity Act, which finally went into effect in time for the fall 2010 semester. It requires publishers to offer books and other materials, such as CDs, separately rather than in costly bundles. And, most importantly, colleges are now required to publish the cost of

books in course catalogs.

In its discovery process, Congress identified several factors that inflate college book prices. The most damaging is that the primary choosers of books are not the primary users. That is, teachers usually select the books, but students pay for them.

Congress also noted that college books tend to be "price inelastic," meaning that buyers do not meet increases in price with typical resistance. This is understandable, since students are generally hostage to professors' selections.

Interestingly, the condition is not as profound in Europe, where many schools demand lower prices from publishers. Congress learned that one popular economics text cost \$126 in the United States, while the same book was priced at \$76 in Great Britain.

Since lawmakers were gracious enough to give schools two years to get ready for the new regulations, I decided to check a few dozen colleges and universities to see if book prices were now included in course catalogs. Compliance is spotty at best. Here's a particularly galling notice on Princeton University's website: "The system is expected to be generally available to all faculty for input of course reading lists in the spring of 2011, with plans to make complete course reading information available to students by the fall of 2011."

There were no signs of book lists or prices at many schools including Stanford, Boise State, Temple, Florida State and the University of Chicago. At Georgetown University, the student newspaper, The Hoya, reported last week that only 52 percent of courses in the school catalog had books listed for the fall semester.

A few schools, most notably Arizona State, have not only complied with the law, but created handy online features to allow comparisons. Unfortunately, ASU's data shed light on another facet of the problem. It seems that students taking the very same course, such as Intro to Sociology, but from different teachers, are finding that books cost \$150 in one class, but less than \$50 in another.

Technology may soon give students an edge that even Congress was not able to provide. Inside Higher Ed reports that several schools are turning to e-books, with student costs expected to drop by as much as 50percent. The publication says forprofit colleges have been in the vanguard of e-text use, while traditional nonprofit institutions have been slow, in large part because faculty control of the book process remains "sacred."

A good first step in controlling college book costs would be for schools to immediately comply with the law. Another would be for administrators to insist that teachers select books early, and wisely, and avoid unnecessary changes from one edition of a book to the next—which reduces or eliminates the resale market.

And the future can't arrive quickly enough when it comes to e-books on campus. Many of us retain our love for printed volumes for recreational reading, but the exorbitant cost of college books makes a digital fix already, as they say in the library, overdue.

thus distinguishing a true princess from an impostor.

princesses," said Coté. "Each one is a little more unique and different from the last. They all have a unique quality. 

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Peggy Bates dies at 92

PHILANTHROPIST MAJOR SUPPORTER OF SCHOOLS

Peggy Bates was a philanthropist, but it wasn't just money she gave to things she was passionate about, especially education.

"She gave of her time and talents," said Chuck Harmon, head of York School in Monterey. "She is someone who chose not to live a life of affluence and comfort, but

one of service."

Margaret Schieffelin Pardee Bates, 92, who was involved in a long list of charitable causes since moving to the Peninsula in 1946, died Tuesday at her home on Jacks Peak in Monterey. She had been ill about a month.

"Everyone knew Peggy Bates was a powerhouse," said Rep. Sam Farr, D-Carmel, whose late father, Fred, a state senator, encouraged Bates to get involved in education on the Peninsula.

"She had ideas and lots of creative vision," Farr said. "People listened to her."

At age 32, Mrs. Bates won seats on the Monterey elementary and high school district boards. She also served on the first board of

Monterey Peninsula College.

She could be "tenacious" in her causes, said David Bates, oldest of her four sons, who said his mother helped convince Samuel F.B. Morse to donate property for the new college.

Going to college wasn't a given for Bates. Her father, a doctor, was a traditionalist and was against her going. But a family deal was cut that if she lived at home, she could go to Barnard College in New York, said her son Charles "Chip" Bates, a Monterey doctor.

She graduated in 1940, two years after she married Talcott Bates, a doctor who died in 1985. She later earned a master's in American history at Washington University. She taught elementary and high school in North Carolina.

"Once mother got the confidence of a higher education, she was off and running," Chip Bates said.

Although none of her four sons went there, Mrs. Bates chose York School as one of her causes. Harmon believes it was because of the school's mission of giving a good education to people of all socioeconomic backgrounds.

During the civil rights era, Farr said, Mrs. Bates worked to recruit black teachers to Seaside. Some of the teachers became city leaders, he said.

Peggy Baskin, a fellow philanthropist and neighbor for a half-century, said Bates was "the big sister I never had." Baskin said she worked with Bates on a number of committees.

"She was a dispenser of wisdom, with straight talk and kindness.... She had a sense of spirit that was

catching."

"She said I was the daughter she never had," said county Supervisor Jane Parker, a goddaughter of Mrs. Bates. "She was particularly committed to education for women and girls."

Parker said she always received "a lot of interest and encouragement" from Mrs. Bates, who had often been the only woman on boards and committees.

Mrs. Bates was "relatively low key, but quite persuasive," Parker said. If there was something that needed to be done, Bates would jump in and help, Parker said.

"She knew how to get things done," Parker said.

Dr. Bruce Meyer, a retired orthopedic surgeon in Monterey who met Mrs. Bates and her husband in the 1950s, remembered not only Mrs. Bates' commitment to education, but her sense of adventure.

"She loved fly fishing, and skiing with her family,"

he said.

Mrs. Bates and her family made a number of trips to Europe, and in 1972 they made a four-month journey through Turkey, Iran, Afghanistan and Pakistan in a GMC Suburban. It was an arduous journey, David Bates said, but his mother "never got sick."

David Bates said that several years ago he took his mother to visit every county

supervisor.

"Because of her persuasiveness," her son said, a quarter of the proposed September Ranch development near Jacks Peak has been designated for park land.

Mrs. Bates is survived by sons David Bates, Seth Bates and Charles Bates, all of Carmel, and Anthony Stewart Bates of Grand Junction, Colo.; seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. A daughter, Margaret, died in infancy.

A remembrance and celebration will be held at the York School chapel at 3:30

p.m. Sept. 26.

Margaret Schieffelin Pardee Bates

1918 ~ 2010

CARMEL – Philanthropist, conservationist and champion of education, Margaret (Peggy) Bates died peacefully in her Jacks Peak home with family at her side early on Tuesday morning, September 14, 2010. She was 92. Born in New York City on July 22, 1918, her parents were Margaret Trevor Pardee and Irving H. Pardee, M.D. Her maternal grandparents were Margaret Schieffelin Trevor and Henry Graff Trevor, and her paternal grandparents were Ensign Bennett Pardee, M.D. and Clara Burton Pardee. Peggy was a direct descendent through her mother of William Brewster who emigrated from England to America on the Mayflower in 1620 and was the religious leader of the Plymouth Colony. (10th descent)

Peggy attended Chapin School in New York City during her primary and secondary grades, received her B.A. from Barnard College (1940), her M.A. in American history from Washington University in 1941 and was a

PhD. Candidate in American history at Columbia University. Her advisor was the eminent historian Henry Steele Commager.

Her studies were interrupted by World War II. During the war she was an administrative assistant for National Defense Training at Barnard College and then an elementary and high school teacher at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina.

Peggy and her husband, Talcott Bates, M.D., whom she married in 1938, moved to the Monterey Peninsula in 1946. As a relative newcomer and encouraged by State Senator Fred Farr she become involved with education and at the age of 32 won seats on both the Monterey Elementary School and High School District boards and was also elected to the first junior college district board. She served on all of these boards from 1951-1957 and as chair from 1953 to 1957.

Peggy was instrumental in the founding of Monterey Peninsula College, initially through the creation of 13th and 14th grades attached to the high school and then by working with Allen Griffin, owner of the Monterey Peninsula Herald, to convince S.F.B. Morse to provide the property on Fremont Street in Monterey for the campus. In 1960, Governor Pat Brown appointed her to the State Board of Education and Trustee of the California State Universities and Colleges serving from 1960-1969. She was the first representative of the "junior colleges" on the State Coordinating Council for Higher Education. Inspired possibly by her own parents' resistance when she chose to attend college, Peggy took particular interest in expanding educational opportunities for young women, encouraging them to prepare for and pursue higher education and providing advice and support for their professional advancement.

The list of boards and commissions on which Peggy served is too long to present, but on the Peninsula she served on the Board of Trustees of the Monterey Institute of International Studies, on the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee of York School, on the CSUMB President's Council, and was an active supporter of the Monterey Peninsula College Foundation and a member of its advisory council. Nationally she was a Trustee of Barnard College, a director of the Council for Basic Education and a member of the Senior Accrediting Commission of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.



In the more than 60 years she lived on the Monterey Peninsula, Peggy Bates came to personify the role of citizen-educator.

Peggy was also a conservationist particularly when it came to the Monterey Peninsula and its pine forests. In 1961 she and her husband Talcott purchased Jacks Peak and after years of effort and the assistance of The Nature Conservancy this property became the core of Jacks Peak County Park which over the years has grown to almost 1000 acres. As recently as two years ago Peggy visited every county supervisor, wrote letters and attended supervisors' meetings arguing for pine forest protections in developments adjacent to Jacks Peak County Park.

Peggy shared Talcott's interest in child welfare and child abuse prevention. She continued after his death to support the work he had begun and contributed generously to facilities and programs benefiting children at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, Natividad Medical Center, Monterey Sports Center, the Family Re-

source Center and the Child Abuse Prevention Council.

During her active life Peggy received many awards and honors including Monterey County Commission on the Status of Women: Outstanding Ten Women for 1998, California State University Monterey Bay Distinguished Fellow Award, Monterey Peninsula College Foundation: Citizen of the Year 2008, National Philanthropy Day: Outstanding Philanthropist 2009. Her papers from the 1960's onward can be found at the Hoover Institution at Stanford University.

Throughout her life travel was a passion. She, her husband and four sons spent a year during 1957-58 traveling throughout Europe, the first of many trips to that continent. In 1972, again with the entire family, she traveled for four months via GMC suburban through Turkey, Iran, Afghanistan and Pakistan. Try to make that trip today! She and Talcott were among the early travelers to China after diplomatic relations were re-established and they made several trips to that country. Peggy continued to travel in Asia, Africa and Europe until last year when she was no longer able to do so. Her last trip was to New York City and Connecticut in April 2010.

Peggy will be remembered as a gentle, modest and gracious individual who gave time and treasure to the causes she loved and attention and love to her family. She neither said nor thought ill of anyone, and she didn't have a selfish bone in her body. Above all Peggy was guided though life by a profound sense of noblesse oblige.

A great woman: We will not soon forget her.

She was a founding member of the Casa Abrego Club in Monterey, a member of the Junior League of the City of New York and of the National Society of Colonial Dames of America. She particularly enjoyed her poetry

group and her play reading group and was active in both until the very end.

Peggy is survived by her four sons, David Talcott, Seth Pardee and Charles Carroll, all of Carmel, and Anthony Stewart of Grand Junction, CO; seven grandchildren and three great grandchildren. She was predeceased by her husband, Talcott, who died in 1985 and by her daughter, Margaret Schieffelin who died in infancy.

Her family extend special thanks to Richard King, M.D., Michael Galloway, M.D., Heartland Hospice and

the devoted care givers who helped her during her final days.

Whatever it is that makes some people special, Peggy Bates had it in abundance. The way she talked, the way people gravitated to her, she reminded us of Eleanor Roosevelt and other great women of the 20th century. And though she performed her good deeds on the relatively small stage of the Monterey Peninsula, it was pioneering work that helped make the community, and the world, a much better place.

Many young people today would be surprised to learn how hard it was for women to go to college in her day, much less persuade men such as Samuel F. B. Morse to donate property for what would become Monterey Peninsula College.

It was 1950 when Peggy Bates was elected to the Monterey elementary and high school boards. The status of women had been boosted somewhat by their wartime multitasking, but the women's movement was decades away. A woman's place was still very much in the home, though Bates was far

too busy to spend all her time in hers.

After receiving a degree from Barnard College, young Margaret Schieffelin Pardee earned a master's degree in American history from Washington University. She was studying for a doctorate at Columbia when war broke out. She worked first

in defense education at Barnard and then taught at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

She moved to the Peninsula in 1938 with her husband, Dr. Talcott Bates, and immediately became a leader in education efforts at all levels. Simultaneously, she became heavily involved with prestigious York School, though none of her four sons attended, and with recruiting black teachers to the schools of Seaside. After helping to start Monterey Peninsula College and serving on its first board, she served with distinction on the state Board of Education and as a trustee of the California State Universities and Colleges.

Locally, nonprofit organizations considered it a great accomplishment to woo her onto their boards, and she obliged many. Her personal causes included child abuse and conservation, and she donated heavily to those and many others. Those who enjoy the open spaces and splendid vistas of Jacks Peak County Park have Peggy Bates to thank.

She won every imaginable woman of the year and citizen of the year award and was active in several organizations, including poetry and reading groups. She was the best friend to many, mentor to many others and the biggest contributor to a long list of endeavors.

Peggy Bates might have accomplished some of that without her grace and her modesty, but perhaps then somewhat fewer people would mourn her passing at age 92.

MPC's 'Princess and the Pea' sparkles with wit

The Monterey Peninsula College Storybook Theatre has another delightful treat in store for its audience no matter what their ages with their current offering "The Princess and the Pea."

The thoroughly appealing adaptation of the original Hans Christian Andersen story by Michele Vacca (who is an expert at creating scripts that bring beloved tales to truly enjoyable stage life), is a sparkling, absorbing and very well done entertainment.

The remarkably fine stage design that meets your eyes as you enter sets an anticipation of a standard of performance that is very high.

Director Laura Coté and her very able cast were adept at bringing out the nuances and expressions which captured attention and added depth and flavor to the familiar story.

Highly original and clever details were fun to take note of. There is a humorous light touch that pervades the action and the text and a finely polished cast brings it to sparkling life.

The "Ancient Book of Wit and Wisdom" was a handsome, old-looking tome sitting on a pedestal where it could easily be consulted to provide the

rationale of the prince's search for a princess bride with the required sensitivity to prove her "princessness."

The 19½ year-old Prince Valiant, played with proper dignity and purposefulness by Sam Fife, must go bride hunting when, according to the Ancient Book, he must choose from the princesses in the neighboring kingdoms.

Fife takes his role very seriously and

his reactions to the oddities he encounters enroute are natural and rational.

His delight when he meets Princess Olivia, who was obviously the right one for him, are pleasing to see and has you rooting for him to overcome any obstacles.

Princess Olivia, charmingly played by Tatum Tollner, who arrived wet and bedraggled just at the right moment, was a fine match for the hero of the tale. She has a sweetness of manner and a sensitive yet regal air that made her ideal for the role.

All of these goings-on are ruled and ordained with deliciously wry comedic strength by Nancy Kocher as Queen Maude, Valiant's grandmother.

She is indomitable and must be obeyed. Kocher's forceful creation of this character's strength is masterful and very funny.

She also pushes around her son, King Maximillian, who cannot resist her. John Affinito is a master comedian and his well-expressed underdog status is another colorful facet of his character.

Prince Valiant's squire, Donald Dunce, who adeptly

saves the day, is personified by L.F. Thomas, yet another master comedian.

He seesaws between a certain dimwittedness and a weaselly wisdom with great aplomb. He is also a versatile scene stealer. One tends to watch him closely to see what he will do next.

Kyra Shugar as Esmeralda Smythe (the wisest gypsy in the kingdom because she is the only gypsy in the kingdom) is another provider of humor as the show proceeds. She pops in and out, and her flourishes and gestures are fun to see.

Prince Valiant met four princesses in his original search: Princess Minerva (Lanier Fairchild), an intellectual only interested in book learning; P rincess Diana (Adriane Oglietti), who only wants to dance and sing; Princess Beaulah (Marina Jones) the beautiful, conceited self-admirer; and Princess Stella the Strong (Sarah Jones), who enters with a Tarzanlike screech, are perfectly cast. Each player is differently delineated and a pleasure to watch. They all are hilarious.

Finally, Deena Welch as Lady Hildegarde rounded out a polished cast who made this show a positive joy to experience.

The details of the production are outstanding. Starting with the handsome and imposing set design of Reed Scott, then the fine and decorative costume design of Michelle Vallentyne and the choreography of Sherri Beck, all contributed to the high quality of the production.

"The Princess and the Pea" has a wealth of imagination marching through it. It's a real fairy tale experience and another "don't-miss-it theatrical event."

However, De Anza was whistled for personal foul for roughing the kicl giving MPC a first down at the Dons'


One incompletion later, Fales Lobo workhorse running back K Graf in the left flat. Graf soared over goal line for what proved to be the ga winner.

A three-and-out by MPC and a failed fourth down pass by the Dons at the Lobo 37 set up the final heroics.

"We made some errors in the red zone and the defense made some mistakes," Rasmussen said. "We just need to tackle better.

"The best part was the end when we made a great stop at our own end of the field in the fourth quarter. It was all heart. It was a total team game across the board."

"He had 160 yards last week (a 32-18 loss at Contra Costa)," Rasmussen said. "He's done a good job in both games."

As to whether he's going to stay with a two-QB system, Rasmussen remarked, "It looks like it's working. We have the guys to do it and they are working well together."

MPC will take a 1-1 record into another home game next Saturday at 6 p.m. De Anza fell to 1-1, following a season-opening 35-9 romp over Gavilan.

When I used to lecture at the UC Berkeley and elsewhere, I always made a point of keeping my required reading Lists to a minimum in order to save my students unnecessary costs. Whatever books I selected, I wanted them to be useful future references for continuing studies.

HIGHLIGHTS OF REGULAR BOARD MEETING August 19, 2010

- 1. The board met with legal counsel in Closed Session as permitted by Government Code Section 54956. Information was provided and direction was given to legal counsel and staff.
- 2. Craig Paoli, Program Director for Genesis House, provided the quarterly Community Advisory Board Committee Report for the period of April-June 2010. In April the program hosted the annual presentation to the United Way Allocations Panel; as usual our clients shared personal, powerful stories of how our programs have given them the ability to make healthy, positive changes in their lives. In May, Genesis House celebrated those who have successfully completed the program with their Annual Graduation Ceremony. Also in May, a decision was made to eliminate the Extended Stay Program (ESP) to ensure utilization of all contract dollars. FY 2010/11 contract will provide treatment for 17 residential and 5 perinatal; the rest will need to be filled with private pay clients.
- 3. Annette Yee Steck, Finance Committee Chair, reported that the committee met earlier in the day to discuss June 2010 financials. FY 2009/10 was a tough year. The agency managed to end the year in the positive, only because management and board continued to make necessary cuts and reductions to programs and staff. Annette was happy to report that the county is current on its payables. All contracts for FY 10/11 have been approved and most are signed. The Line of Credit Loan from Nonprofit Finance is in the process of being completed, contingent on the refinance of the second mortgage of Genesis House. The Finance Committee met in Closed Session on August 5th to discuss the status of the agency 403(b) account; no action was taken at that meeting. There is an action item in this month's packet to approve an extension for the Garden Road Lease, until a new lease can be negotiated. Some key positions will have furlough days reinstated during the Executive Director's absence, per the approved Interim Management Plan.
- 4. The board approved the 2010/11 Action Plan Update, to include development of a long-range strategic plan.
- 5. The board approved an extension for the Garden Road Lease.
- 6. The board approved the closure of the Work Achievement Program and the reduction in hours for the Youth Program Assistants.
- 7. The board approved three resolutions authorizing staff to sign loan documents, contracts, etc. in the absence of the Executive Director.
- 8. Stanford Alumni Consulting Team provided a Power Point presentation with recommendations to staff and board which will be used to develop a long-range strategic plan. Board Chair Harvey Kuffner appointed a Strategic Planning Committee.

The next board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 16, 2010 and will be held at Sand City City Hall, One Sylvan Park, Sand City, CA 93955.

MPC Active Bond/Facility Projects Update September 13, 2010

MPC Education Center (at Marina) Permanent Buildings – The five building floor slabs have been completed. Concrete tilt-up wall panels have been formed and poured on the existing floor slabs. The panels are "curing" and will be "tilted up" to form the walls the week of September 20, 2010. Work will be completed by late spring/early summer of 2011. Classes will commence the fall semester of 2011.

<u>Infrastructure</u> – Site work (lighting, parking lots, sidewalks) will be ongoing for the next few years. The bus drop off adjacent to the old Student Services Building has been expanded to accommodate access for two buses. The trellis and columns supporting the trellis in front of the gym and adjacent to the amphitheater have been removed due to possible structural concerns.

New Student Services Building – The first plaster coat ("scratch coat") and the second plaster coat "brown coat" have been applied. After that is cured, the final "color coat" will be applied. Once the exterior work is completed and weather tight, the drywall installation will begin. Completion is now anticipated in January of 2011. There have been some architectural design issues that are being addressed with the Architect (HGA). Discussions continue with the contractor for schedule recovery.

<u>Auto Technology Building</u> – The work has been completed and the Notice of Completion is being filed.

<u>Swing Space</u> – The Architect (HGHB) received DSA approval for additional swing space south of the Theatre. The "Swing Space Village" is scheduled to be completed by January of 2011. The swing space plan has being modified due to unanticipated State funding for the Old Student Services/ Humanities Projects that may accelerate the master schedule.

<u>Facilities Committee</u> – The Committee meets periodically to review construction issues, budgets and schedules.

<u>Business / Computer Science Building</u> – Interior wall framing is complete. The electrical and mechanical "rough-in" has been completed on the first floor. The windows and drywall will be installed commencing September 17, 2010. Construction is progressing as scheduled.

<u>Humanities</u> / Old Student Services / Business Humanities — On June 14, 2010 the Chancellor's Office notified MPC that approval was received to submit the drawings to DSA. The project is still on track to receive State matching funds. The Architect (HGHB) has submitted drawings to DSA. The State Chancellor's Office requires submittals and approvals during the design phase and requires authorization to go to bid and to award the bid.

<u>Theatre</u> – The Architect (HGA) continues with the Design Phase drawings, and the drawings are ready to be submitted to DSA in September of 2010. However, options are being evaluated to modify the Theatre to become a Performing Arts center which would accommodate both musical and theatrical performances. Discussions continue in the Facilities Committee.

<u>Life Science / Physical Science Buildings</u> – The Architect (HGHB) has completed schematic drawings and has begun the working drawings. The design is nearing completion and will be submitted to DSA for approval in October 2010. Dependent upon DSA approval time, construction is anticipated to begin in the summer of 2011.

<u>Music Buildings</u> – The Architect (HGA) has prepared schematic drawings with different design options, and the Facilities Committee is reviewing the options and the budgets for the different alternatives. One of the options is to have musical presentations in the Theatre. Direction given for the Theatre may impact the design of the Music Building.

<u>Gym First Floor/ Pool/ Tennis Courts</u> – The Architect (HGHB) has completed schematic drawings and has begun the working drawings. This project may be phased, and work on the tennis courts may be the first phase. The Gym first floor work has to be completed before work on the pool can be done. This project may be bid as 3 separate projects as construction scheduling has to coincide with the various sports schedules.

<u>Student Center</u> – The Architect (HGHB) is preparing schematic drawings for available space options. Planning meetings have involved student representatives. It is anticipated that construction could begin in the fall of 2011 (dependent upon DSA approval time).

<u>Outside Lockers adjacent to the Art Buildings</u> – The Architect (HGHB) is preparing drawings to be submitted to DSA. The work will be done as weather permits and as not to impact class schedules.
