

Re: AB 806 (Wilk) SUPPORT

Dear Assembly Member Williams:

I am writing to you today to ask you for your support of AB 806. This long overdue legislation allows colleges that hire faculty librarians and faculty counselors to count the compensation for these faculty members as integral to the instructional programs on college campuses.

Opponents to this concept diminish the role of counselors and librarians. Librarian faculty members are an integral part of the instructional design and implementation process for all courses, especially for online courses. Counseling faculty members are an essential component of our student success strategies. Librarians and counselors are engaged in our faculty shared governance process, paid on the same scale (often on tenure-track), contribute strongly to institutional accreditation processes, and participate on Academic Senate. They are faculty. Let us count them as such.

As you may know, in 1961 the *Fifty Percent Law* (EC Sec. 17503) was enacted for K-12 as a way to promote class size reduction by designating that 50% of all funding should only be used for faculty salaries and benefits. When the community college system was separated from K-12, this law, among others, was simply rolled into community college operations, but is considered a "carry over" from a time when K-12 schools and "junior colleges" were part of the same financing structure.

Fast forward to 2013 and you now find that faculty has collective bargaining to protect their rights, as well as 75/25 and the faculty obligation number (FON). AB 1725 has passed, giving faculty increased authority and collegial consultation. Teaching methods, undreamed of in 1961 when the law was passed, are now the norm. Smart classrooms, new technology for managing information and online distance learning programs are the standard now, and student success is the goal we all strive to achieve.

One problem: none of it, including counselors and librarians, is regarded as instruction as far as the 50% calculation is applied.

What this means in practical terms for a college district is that for every dollar you spend on classroom technology or a librarian or a counselor—you have to spend another dollar on faculty compensation—in order to avoid falling below the 50% threshold.

Add to this a series of continuous budget cuts, year after year. In an era of improving outcomes and meeting ever-increasing demands for accountability, what you are unfortunately left with is a fiscal disaster waiting to happen on a growing number of campuses throughout California—a state where community colleges are a major component of the engine to economic recovery! In fact, the disaster has already happened. The financial undermining of community colleges in California is the significant roadblock in effecting the vital mission they play in the health of our state. Now more than ever, our community colleges need funding to adjust to the ever-increasing challenges of quality program delivery to ensure access and success for our students.

Since the 50% law was enacted over 50 years ago, there have been considerable changes and advancements in instructional methods, policy, mandates and technology. Each year, community colleges have struggled to keep pace with it all. At the same time, college districts have had to stay true to the 50% calculation or suffer extreme financial consequences.

Assembly Member Wilk's bill would finally make some small but needed adjustments to keep the 50% rule in place, but to modernize the definition of the true costs directly associated to instruction and include them on the right side of the equation. This includes counselors, librarians, coordinators, and department chairs.

Again, none of these items is currently counted as "instructional expense" and yet all are essential to student success—and paying for them must currently come from the shrinking half of the budget known as discretionary funding.

As a result of the changing demands for delivering education, coupled with the fiscal constraints of the state, districts must be allowed to recognize all costs of education within the context of the 50% law to ensure student success and the on-going viability of the Community College system.

Thank you for your kind attention! I appreciate your consideration of this issue, and stand ready to provide you with whatever additional information you need to gain your support of this bill.

Many of these employees need training in everything from English as a Second Language to Hospitality Management.


MPC is looking forward to working with Mission College in addressing the distinct regional needs in our hospitality industry. We believe that our efforts will be an economic driver for our area.

Enclosed are five copies of a DVD developed by the California State Bar Council on Access and Fairness, which promotes the profession of law to community college students. The video was developed under the leadership of Thuy Thi Nguyen, general counsel at Peralta CCD, and a committee that included your colleagues Brian King and Sandra Serrano.

The State Bar Council on Access and Fairness recognizes that students who have attended community college bring a socio-economic diversity and unique understanding of legal issues facing Californians, particularly within our communities with limited access to lawyers.

I can personally attest to a number of students in my law school class at UC Davis who, but for the educational opportunity provided by community college, they would not have had access to the legal profession. And, while we joke about the number of lawyers, these community college alumni are working as district attorneys, public defenders, immigration lawyers, and many other fields in which they return to give back to their community. I believe it's a particular asset that community college alumni take with them after law school.

Wednesday, May 1, is Law Day, U.S.A. The day was declared by President Dwight Eisenhower in 1958, and codified into federal statute in 1961:

- (1) in appreciation of their liberties and the reaffirmation of their loyalty to the United States and of their rededication to the ideals of equality and justice under law in their relations with each other and with other countries; and
- (2) for the cultivation of the respect for law that is so vital to the democratic way of life.

SUBJECT: First Monday – May 2013

Colleagues,

The following are items of interest and importance for our system, and are provided for your information. If you have comments or concerns on any of these items feel free to email me at bharris@cccco.edu or telephone me at 916-322-4005.

- 1. Restoring Access to Our Colleges: As you know, we were able to begin modestly adding back classes in January after the successful passage of Proposition 30. And, we expect some additional dollars to be available in the coming budget to continue restoring the access that has been lost from our system over the past four years. I have said publically on many occasions in recent months that, as we restore access, we must be mindful of the direction we have been given by the Legislature and Administration to focus that restoration on transfer, career/technical education and remedial coursework. On a related note, in recent weeks we have received a large number of courses for approval whereby an existing course has been leveled to create a total of 4 new courses to address non-repeatable course options. I encourage each of you to carefully review these submissions to ensure that the changes are clearly based on sound educational justification and are not merely a way to deal with the new restrictions on course repeatability recently approved by the Board of Governors. In some cases I am sure that these submissions are welljustified. However, we must not be seen as manipulating our curriculum simply to avoid the repeatability rules. If you have any questions on this issue, I encourage you to contact Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs, Barry Russell.
- 2. Workforce Training Doing What Matters for Jobs and the Economy: As you know, the Chancellor's Office is reorganizing its approach to workforce training through the "Doing What MATTERS for Jobs and the Economy" initiative. This approach aligns with state and federal changes as well as market conditions that exist in our recovering economy. A number of you heard updates at the recent CEO conferences about this push to work more collaboratively on a regional basis to address labor market needs and better leverage scarce resources. A suggestion raised was the need to incorporate more workforce elements into professional development programs for college administrators, and my staff have already taken action on this working through ACCCA. A second idea was to sponsor CEO-specific development that helps our



leaders further student success through Career Technical Education programming. I will be working with College of the Canyons President Dianne Van Hook to see if the CEO Academy format could apply here. In the meantime, several leaders in our system have volunteered to host conversations among CEOs on what it means to respond collaboratively to a region's workforce needs. I'm attaching a list of who will be convening these discussions in the state's seven macro regions, and I hope you will all participate in this important conversation. If you have any questions regarding this initiative feel free to call Vice Chancellor, Van Ton-Quinlivan directly.

- 3. <u>City College of San Francisco Hosts AACC:</u> As many of you know, last week City College of San Francisco welcomed all our colleagues from around the nation as they served as the host college for the annual meeting of the American Association of Community Colleges. Congratulations to Interim Chancellor Scott-Skillman, San Francisco Mayor Ed Lee and all the faculty and staff at the college for rolling out the welcome mat and representing all California community colleges so effectively.
- 4. Community College Baccalaureate: When the Board of Governors met in retreat recently the increasing trend of community colleges in other states offering the Bachelor's degree was discussed. Currently, community colleges in 23 other states offer one or more Bachelor's degrees many of those are applied Baccalaureates. At that retreat I told the Board of my intention to form a taskforce to look into this issue, and at last month's Consultation Council I distributed the enclosed taskforce charge and membership. At this point I do not have a strong feeling on this issue. On the one hand our colleges have struggled to keep up with the demands on our existing mission, but on the other, there are several of our programs where students are increasingly being told by employers that a Bachelor's degree is a strong preference and in some cases a requirement for entry into the field. There has been more than one piece of legislation offered in California in recent years that would have given our colleges this opportunity, and I believe there are likely to be more in the future. For those reasons, it seems important for us to have our own internal conversation which could ultimately inform the Board of Governors in future discussions. I will keep you apprised of the progress of the group which will be Chaired by Vice Chancellor Barry Russell.
- discussion within the system concerning the increased student success when high school students are engaged by community colleges before they graduate. This happens in a variety of ways, including the offering of college classes at the high school. I need to remind you of the limitations placed on the system back in 2003 when legislation was passed that specifically limited the offering of community college classes on high school campuses. The legislation said that if courses were offered on a high school campus they must not be held during the time a campus was closed to the general public (Education Code Section 76002.a.3). This limitation remains in effect and the language of the statute specifically states that the school district governing board must define what it means to be "closed to the general public" in a regular board meeting, not simply in an MOU with the college. If you are considering such courses I encourage you to have a discussion with your local districts to see how this issue might be resolved. There are some available exceptions if the class is conducted as contract education, but please investigate these offerings carefully before proceeding.
- 6. <u>State Controller's Request for Compensation Information:</u> I suspect that most of you have already begun work on the information recently requested by California State Controller John Chiang related to Government Compensation in California (GCC). In addition to a letter from the Controller you should also have received the Electronic Reporting Instructions for Community College Districts. I encourage each of you to respond prior to the June 14, 2013 deadline.

California Community College Baccalaureate Degree Study Group



Background:

There has been renewed interest in the addition of bachelor degree options to the California community college mission. The establishment of bachelor degree programs at community colleges is seen by some as a strategy to increase college participation rates for local residents who are unable to relocate because of family or work commitments or to address the needs of rural communities and the state's need for additional bachelor degree-trained individuals in high demand disciplines.

A Task Force to study the issue will be appointed by the Chancellor to review the various aspects of bachelor degrees at community colleges. Many states have ongoing programs that provide research into the effectiveness of the programs. In addition, current demographic, economic, and workforce trends will be analyzed to determine the need for such a program in California.

Charge:

The study group will look at the following factors, in addition to others:

- How would bachelor's degree programs complement other programs and courses offered by the community colleges.
- How bachelor's degree programs would address specific regional or state workforce needs.
- Documented demand for additional bachelor's graduates in the programs proposed.
- Additional costs of delivering the proposed bachelor's degree programs.
- Admission criteria that could be used by colleges in selecting students to be admitted to the bachelor's degree programs along with the number of students to be admitted to and served by the programs.
- Whether the proposed bachelor's degree programs would unnecessarily duplicate the degree programs offered by other postsecondary education institutions in certain regions (CSU, UC, and private).
- How articulation strategies might complement or possibly limit the movement of students from community colleges to the CSU or UC systems.

- The implications on the existing accreditation of California community colleges should the bachelor's degree option be added.
- Ability of community colleges to support bachelor's degree programs including the adequacy of facilities, faculty, administration, libraries, and other student support and academic resources.
- What changes would needed at the Chancellor's Office to support community college bachelor's degree (curriculum, student services, fiscal, facilities, etc.) programs.
- Data collection and evaluation needed to measure the success and effectiveness of bachelor's degree program.

HONORING THE VICTIMS OF THE TRAGEDY IN BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

As a mark of respect for the victims of the senseless acts of violence perpetrated on April 15, 2013, in Boston, Massachusetts, by the authority vested in me as President of the United States by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, I hereby order that the flag of the United States shall be flown at half-staff at the White House and upon all public buildings and grounds, at all military posts and naval stations, and on all naval vessels of the Federal Government in the District of Columbia and throughout the United States and its Territories and possessions until sunset, April 20, 2013. I also direct that the flag shall be flown at half-staff for the same length of time at all United States embassies, legations, consular offices, and other facilities abroad, including all military facilities and naval vessels and stations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this sixteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord two thousand thirteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-seventh.





Sarlo Endowment Project Description

Scope of project and goals:

The overarching goal is to support a Sarlo Endowment Project for one faculty member per year. It is the intent of the Professional Recognition Board (PRB) to announce each year's awardee prior to the end of spring semester. A Sarlo Endowment Project could be completed during the summer and/or fall so that the project presentation can be made during the spring Flex days. The project timeline can begin in Summer 2013 and all expenditures must be made and accounted for by the end of the spring semester 2014. The funds provided for the Sarlo Endowment Project would cover any associated project costs in the amount of \$5,000. Only one award will be made each year so applicants are encouraged to plan comprehensive projects which will maximize the \$5,000 award.

Project Categories:

Study

The Sarlo Endowment Project may be one of academic study in residence at an accredited university or college. Proposed course work shall be planned to achieve specific objectives.

A Special Project or Research Program

Such a program may be planned with specific objectives which are relevant to the faculty member's assignment.

Work Experience

This project category is intended chiefly for faculty who wish to study in schools maintained by a business or industry for craftsmen or technical workers or to obtain work experience in the vocational field in which the employee works. A description of the specific school or work experience shall be submitted with the proposed program.

Curriculum Planning

A project for curriculum planning may be awarded after the applicant has submitted a proposal demonstrating need and purpose for revision of existing courses or development of new courses.

Combination of Objectives

A project which is designed to meet the multiple objectives of study, research, work experience, and/or curriculum planning may be awarded after the applicant has submitted a proposal containing specific objectives and relevance to the institutional assignment.

Garrison Fund for Educational Excellence Project Description

Scope of project and goals:

On behalf of Dr. Douglas Garrison and Mrs. Renee Rutan-Garrison, this fund was established in 2013 with a donation from the Garrisons to create an annual project award for MPC faculty. The purpose of this award is to honor the tenure of Dr. Douglas Garrison as Superintendent/President of Monterey Peninsula College while providing funding for faculty member summer sabbaticals with an overall intention of enhancing the classroom experience for students.

The annual \$500 award is to be used to fund one or more summer projects ["summer sabbatical"] that will enhance MPC classes through implementation of innovative instructional methodologies, inclusion of research findings, exposure to recent developments in specific academic fields or other activities that will enhance the classroom experience for our students.

Part-time faculty members are eligible for this award if none of the full-time faculty member submissions rise to the level of the part-time faculty member submissions.



Hartnell's Shipman tosses 2-hitter vs. MPC

A battle between two of the top pitchers in the Coast Conference South lived up to its billing Monday as the host Hartnell softball team beat MPC 2-1.

North Salinas alumna Danielle Shipman, who leads the conference in strikeouts with 156, allowed two hits and one run while striking out six for Hartnell (30-6, 12-3).

"All season, Dani has been on top of things and coming up clutch" Hartnell right fielder Kaycee Gonzales said. "She's putting her heart out there, so there's nothing more you can ask for from a pitcher."

Shipman stranded eight Lobos runners in scoring position.

"We had runners on almost every inning, but we just couldn't get them across," said MPC center fielder Katie Ditler.

The Lobos reached base safely nine times against Shipman, but they went 0-for-11 with runners in scoring position. Shipman got a strikeout with the bases loaded and two outs in the third and with runners on second and third and two out in the fifth.

"We shouldn't have lost that game," Ditler said.

MPC (25-12, 8-7) finally broke through in the sixth. Salinas High alumnus Brittany Enny led off the inning with a double. She advanced to third on Alyssa Sargent's sacrifice bunt and scored on a wild pitch.

Monterey High alumna Alyssa Seva'aetasi went 2-for-2 with an RBI for Hartnell. Her single in the third gave the Panthers a 1-0 lead.

MPC pitcher Beverly Miller, who came into the game with a conference leading 1.29 ERA, shut down a Hartnell offense that had scored over 10 runs a game in its past three games. Up until the seventh inning, the only run Miller allowed was unearned.

The score was 1-1 in the bottom of the seventh when Gonzales hit a walk-off single through the hole between first and second base.

"I wanted a hit because I had a strikeout right before," Gonzales said. "In my mind I was thinking, 'I'm going to get this hit."

Brandee Ho, who scored both of Hartnell's runs, got the rally started with a single up the middle. North County alumna Andrea Estigoy moved Ho to second on a walk to set up Gonzales.

Miller took the loss, despite allowing just one earned run and six hits.

"Bev did awesome today," Ditler said. "I haven't seen her pitch that well all season. She hit her spots, they just made that last contact."

Ditler said the Lobos need to finish strong in each of their final two regular season games to try and earn a spot in the playoffs. MPC, which was ranked ninth in Northern California in last week's coaches poll, plays at West Valley on Thursday and hosts San Jose City on April 23.

Hartnell looks to nearly be a lock for the postseason. The Panthers were ranked second in Northern California and fifth in the state in the latest coaches poll. Hartnell could move into first place with a win at Cabrillo on Thursday.

"Our goal is the playoffs, most definitely," Gonzales said. "But for these next two games (our goal) is just to win, that's all we need."

Steve Dorsey did all he could in the decathlon's final event, even beating the leader by a stride in the 1,500 meter run.

Yet, the Monterey Peninsula College freshman fell four points short Wednesday, finishing second to Jason Dunn of Sacramento City College in the Northern California decathlon championships at the College of San Mateo.

Dunn compiled 6,493 points to Dorsey's 6,489 points

The pair will meet again on May 11 at the state track and field championships at American River College. This was just Dorsey's second decathlon, a two-day, 10-event competition.

Dorsey, a two-time state meet qualifier in the high jump at Monterey High, trailed Dunn by 17 points going into the final event, running a career-best 4:50.48 in the 1,500.

Dorsey finished second overall in the 110 high hurdles (15.55), 11th in the discus, 13th in the pole vault, fourth in the javelin and eighth in the 1,500 on the second day of the competition.

Hartnell College's Austin Decker finished 10th overall with 5,731 points while teammate Jake Singley was 14th with 5,385 points.

MPC Lobos: With Foothill College dropping golf, the Monterey Peninsula College men's golf squad, along with normal Coast Conference members Chabot and San Jose CC, has found itself being hosted by the Central Valley Conference this season. Conferences must have three teams for official competition.

While things are different, the Lobos are still playing well, as evidenced by their recent second placed finish in a Central Valley Conference tourney at Kings River CC.

"We've been having a good season," head coach Justin Russo said.

With three tournaments left, MPC is already eyeing the NorCal Championship, to be held May 6 at Diablo Grande. Should they get to the State Championship, they'll have home course advantage. This year's CCCAA State Finals will be May 13 at Rancho Canada GC.

Leading the Lobos has been former AT&T Pebble Beach Jr. Golf Association sensation Will Cross, who has the best scoring average (73.8) in the conference. Pacific Grove High grad Michael Kraft, who made it to State last year, has a 74.3 average. Jordan Miller has a 75.3 average.

440 homeless people are in Monterey, says a 2011 census

Amid increased public outcry about the city's homeless population, the Monterey City Council will hold an evening study session Wednesday on the subject.

A 13-page council report prepared for the session says a 2011 census counted 440 homeless people in Monterey. It cautions that homelessness, unlawful behavior and activities affecting health and safety "are not one in the same and cannot be addressed with the same tools and strategies."

The council session comes in advance of a first-time, Peninsula-wide "Hungry and Homeless in Paradise" conference to be held May 18 at Monterey Peninsula College.

The council report breaks down different groups of homeless people, looks at different ways of addressing the complex issue, notes what the city already is doing, and says public complaints about transients are on the rise.

"Most causes of homelessness are outside the the control of government agencies," the report says. "There are no easy answers or solutions, only good intentions, inadequate resources and growing frustrations."

The homeless population comprises the "truly homeless" who have suffered severe economic setbacks, persons with substance-abuse, mental-health or other traumatic problems, and growing numbers of young "travelers" living nomadic lifestyles, the report says.

The city itself — with its moderate climate, seasonal visitors with disposable income and beaches, parks and greenbelts — are "reasons for the area's attractiveness for people experiencing homelessness."

City officials receive complaints "on a daily basis" from residents, tourists and the business community about the growing numbers of homeless, the report says.

"They report seeing homeless persons sprawled on the sidewalks, urinating in public and acting intimidating," the report says. Areas particularly impacted are downtown, Roberts Lake and the Garden Road, the report says.

In response, the city has created a temporary three-member police team to maintain a presence in the areas most affected. But city officials also have received complaints from the public about "criminalizing poverty" and targeting the homeless, the report says.

The city has ordinances against aggressive panhandling, loitering, littering, consuming alcohol in public, trespassing and other "health and safety" issues, the report says.

But other measures — overnight parking prohibitions in certain areas, expanded no-smoking laws and making it a crime to sit or lie on sidewalks or other public spaces — likely will be brought to the council, the report says.

This year, the city allocated \$123,060 in community development grant money to 13 agencies serving the homeless. That's 50percent below last year's funding level because of the elimination of local redevelopment agencies, the report says.

The report lists about two dozen suggestions received by city officials to respond to homelessness. They range from increasing city contributions to business groups for security to licensing panhandlers.

Flores, who prepped at King City and played two seasons at Hartnell College, is one of two players for the Rainbows to hit a home run this spring, batting .240 in 26 starts.

Ventimilia, who hit just under .300 last year as a freshman, struggled earlier in the season. In just 18 starts this spring at second base, he leads the team in stolen bases and shares the team lead in runs scored.

MPC wins first baseball title since 1971

Glancing towards the dugout, Jake Pannunzio saw his teammates charging toward the mound.

"My first thought was who can I tackle?" the MPC hurler said.

Before Pannunzio could react, he found himself buried at the bottom of the pile with catcher Jesse White as all 30 Lobos piled on in a mass celebration.

"It was pitch dark under there," Pannunzio said.

Never did being in the dark during the light of day feel better for the Australia native, whose complete game Thursday enabled MPC to end a 42-year Coast Conference title drought after a 7-1 win over Hartnell.

"I'm numb," Pannunzio said.

Thanks to a seven-game winning streak to close the conference season, including a 19-inning win on Saturday, the Lobos embraced the moment that hadn't occurred since 1971.

"The last three weeks we've adopted a slogan of one inning at a time," sophomore second baseman Ty Morris said. "Our slogan was to play loose."

Yet, maintaining that loose attitude went out the window when the Lobos turned a double play to end the game.

"After that last out, it (excitement) all kicked in," Morris said.

While the players flew out of the dugout, head coach Daniel Phillips stood and hugged pitching coach Vince Herring near the bench.

"What an amazing feeling," Phillips said.

What an amazing finish to the final three weeks for the Lobos, who were 7-10 at one point in conference before going on a magical run to close the regular season.

"A conference title has been a topic of discussion since last fall," Phillips said. "I do not know if this is my most talented team. But all these kids bought into our beliefs. These are the results.

"Everyone on this team contributed in some way," Morris said. That included the 19-inning game in which Phillips used 28 of his 30

Each player seemed to have a story about landing at MPC.

Pannunzio, who tossed his third complete game, landed in Monterey after sending out video tapes of himself to numerous colleges in the United States while pitching in Australia.

"MPC was the one college that responded," said Pannunzio, who has another season.

Morris and White were at CSUMB last spring. Both ended up at MPC in the fall, with the hopes of getting more playing time and getting some college experience.

"Coach White (CSUMB) gave me the option," said Morris, a converted shortstop. "He told me we want you back in the fall. And I want to return to CSUMB next year."

As a leadoff hitter for MPC, he had three hits against the Panthers, with a pair of doubles and three runs scored.

Morris and Garret Woodward highlighted the Lobos' three-run second inning with back-to-back run scoring doubles.

"When we put up three in the second, it started to kick in," Morris said. "But we all got together in the dugout and said three is not enough."

It was enough when Pannunzio is on the mound. The left-hander didn't allow a hit until the fourth inning, and shut down the Panthers until the seventh when Matthew Antopia singled home a run.

"Coach asked how I was feeling and if I had my second wind," Pannunzio said. "I said yes."

Pannunzio set down seven of the last eight hitters for the Lobos (23-13), who will learn who they face on the postseason best of three series on Sunday.

"This team always gives me crazy run support when I pitch," said Pannunzio, who had a six-run cushion after four innings after Morris doubled home another run.

When Morris ripped his third hit of the game, Woodward, who will play next year at Colorado Mesa University, the same school his dad played for, followed with another RBI double.

The pair had five of the Lobos' eight hits in the leadoff and No. 2 spot, driving in four of the seven runs.

"In the eighth inning, I started counting the outs," Phillips said. "You get your bullpen ready, you start thinking of scenarios that could unfold. Right now I fell nothing but elation for the kids and the school."

After two years living out of traveling cases, staging productions all across the Peninsula and enduring the painful loss of its beloved founder Morgan Stock, the Monterey Peninsula College Theatre Company has found its way back home.

This week, it reconnects with loyal patrons with its soft opening of the three-act domestic comedy "Light Up The Sky," previewing Thursday before beginning its official run Friday. It runs through May 26.

Written by award-winning 20th century play and screenwriter Moss Hart, "Light Up The Sky" focuses on the backstage antics of a new play that initially appears to be a hit.

When things go awry and the production appears doomed, the principals — actor, director, producer and playwright — turn against one another, only to be forced to reconcile once the rave reviews come in and the play turns into a success.

Gary Bolen, MPC theatre arts department chairman and the show's director, said he was determined to direct the first show produced on the newly renovated stage.

"After all we've been through, there was no way I was going to let someone else direct the first play in this theater," said Bolen with a smile. "Even if I was in an iron lung, I was going to have them roll me down there."

Hart's play has been a popular and successful draw since it was first produced in 1948. It's a technically simple play with one set, a small cast, and few elements of sound and lighting.

"There are a lot of technical intricacies when you open up a building like this," said Bolen. "And if you open up with something like a huge musical, that has a lot of technical demands, you're going to find out, and probably not the way you want to, what has gone wrong."

Bolen assembled a veteran cast to handle the "little bumps in the road," as he termed it.

The cast of local veteran performers includes James Brady, Mitchell and Phyllis Davis, Teresa Del Piero, Keith Decker and Alexandra Bristow.

The cast and crew has endured some foibles in opening the new building. Bolen made light of his team's naivete in believing it could immediately begin rehearsals with full lights and stage from day one.

"We thought we were going to have the set-up, and the lights and everything, and we could rehearse the entire time on the set," Bolen said. "Cut to two and a half weeks later and we were still unable to have the set-up because of things happening with leveling the (stage) floor."

Another mishap occurred when the tech crew tested out the stage's electrical system during rehearsal. The fire curtain, which stands between the audience and the stage, came down and it could not be brought back up.

As recently as the weekend before opening night, the crew endured a heat wave with no air conditioning.

"There's no such thing as a simple play. There are always things that happen," said Bolen.

Bolen had high praise for his technical crew, including technical director Dan Beck, master carpenter Eric Maximoff and master electrician Steve Retsky. The technical team has patiently built and struck and rebuilt and re-struck sets

Even with the building re-opening, the tech crew still had to build sets offstage because of the floor situation.

"Once we got the go-ahead to load things on stage, they were ready to go," said Bolen. "They've really done an outstanding job. This is a backstage comedy, so what people aren't seeing is all the stuff that goes on backstage and has been going on the last two years we've been out of the building."

Now, after a long wait, Bolen is eager to re-introduce local theater enthusiasts to his company's new stage.

"I think we've got a really special place now. A lot of the people that have worked with us over the years and have now seen the building, their jaws just drop when they see the renovations that have happened," said Bolen.

He continued, "I'm really looking forward to seeing those first patrons walk through the door. That for me will be the 'We're back' moment. The reason we do this is to bring professional quality theater to the Peninsula. When people walk through the door to see this first show, then we'll (officially) be back."

The Liberal Arts: Notes from Underground

An English professor reports on the academic meetings of two vastly different academic groups.

I cross the border under cover of night and slip into the foreign capital. In my trench coat and hat, I hope to complete my mission unrecognized. On the icy river, lights twinkle from the distant hotel. I hesitate a moment, but walk on; there is no turning back. I will execute my mission.

Spy fiction is littered with initials and acronyms: SMERSH, SPECTRE, NSA, KGB. My non-fiction world has its own: ALSCW, MLA, NAS, ACTC. Last month, on the night in question, I was in Ottawa for the Association for Core Texts and Courses (ACTC) conference. Core texts?

Only months before, I had somehow been elected to the Modern Language Association (\underline{MLA}) Delegate Assembly. In the MLA, to even whisper "core texts" or "great books" is to align yourself with racism, sexism, imperialism, phallocentrism, and white privilege.

I guess to the academy's progressive politburo, my resume had appeared spotless: '60s guy, Civil Rights medal, citation for Women's Lib, Berkeley riots in '68 with tear gas cluster. But these days, that's all deep cover for my real work: spreading the Good News about Great Books.

For twenty years, ACTC has stayed off the radar, quietly tending the garden of core texts and courses, Western civilization, and great books. A Google search for the Association produces just 55,000 hits. I've had more hits for a blog post.

That low profile is because everyone knows that "the first rule of Great Books is that you never talk about Great Books." That is because, in academe, one slip and that friendly Foucauldian in the next office or the quiet multiculturalist down the hall will expose you to the deans, and then the whole messy business unfolds. Out come the knives and the gendarmes of the institution, dispatched to remove your offending presence.

Just ask "Paul" who had dreamed of building a Great Books program like mine but gave up when he realized that "the social science teachers and literature teachers would never permit it."

But off the grid in the frozen north, my comrades and I were free to speak about originality, Western civilization, genius, even religion and morality . . . approvingly. ACTC's executive director, the indefatigable J. Scott Lee, framed it as our "opportunity to share and practice liberal arts education." In fact, one thing that emerged from the conference was the necessity of describing our work as "liberal arts education" rather than "liberal education," the once-honorable word "liberal" having acquired the opposite of its original meaning after years of political abuse.

In Ottawa, the ACTC theme was "Re-thinking the Liberal Arts through Core Texts: Science, Poetry, Philosophy and History." Plenary speakers included Norma Thompson of Yale, speaking on "Jane Austen on Moral Education: the Liberal Arts in Mansfield Park"; John Churchill, secretary of Phi Beta Kappa, on that organization's "New Advocacy Initiative for the Liberal Arts and Sciences"; Richard Kamber, ACTC president and professor of philosophy, asking "Can a Liberal Arts Education Really Make Us Good?" (no); and Victoria Mora, of St. John's College (Santa Fe) on "Re-thinking the Liberal Arts in the Company of Miguel de Cervantes' Sancho Panza."

Panel presenters explored ways to bridge the religious and secular worlds, to put literature, philosophy, and science into collaboration (Kamber reminded us that in Brave New World not only were literature and high art banned, but also science), and to practice internationalism by engaging Europe, China, and Latin America.

The cross-cultural appreciation of Western civilization was bracing, such as in this panel:

Hanke Drop, Jeroen Lutters, and Olga Potters, Windesheim University of Applied Sciences, and Jos Kleemans, University of Applied Sciences Utrecht, "The Need for a New Core in Dutch Education"; Lisa M. Isaacson, Zayed University, "You Shall Not Look through My Eyes Either: Reading for Global Awareness"; Peter Heckman, Zayed University, "Teaching Western Literature in the United Arab Emirates"; Gangcheng Sun, Beijing Institute of Technology, "Confucius' Theoretical Basis to Teach Students in Accordance with their Aptitude and Its Modern Edification."

ACTC presenters do not flog multiculturalism, GLBT, or the oppressed minority du jour. In contrast, the mighty MLA (795 panels to ACTC's 60) has been stuck on spin cycle for decades, rehashing the same preoccupations of the Left: sex, food, bodies, sex, animals, disability, hegemony, Theory, sex, workers, politics, ecology, and sex.

At January's MLA convention in Boston, Thursday alone offered an embarrassment of riches (or just an embarrassment) with sessions on "Literature and the Radical Left" arranged by the Radical Caucus; "Secluded Lives, Visible Bodies: Representations of Zenana Fashion in Film and Literature"; "Early American Sex"; "Fantasizing Stardom", "Queer Theory without Antinormativity"; "Networks, Webs, and Ecosystems"; "Sexuality and Form in English Literature"; "Interiorities of Disability"; "Dirty Chaucer"; "Madness in Black Women's Diasporic Novels and the Aesthetics of Resistance"; and, "Movements, Incantations, and Parables of Queer Performance."

As the University of Virginia's Mark Edmundson once said of the MLA's myriad publisher's stalls, "I walked through the book displays and marveled at the sheer intellect represented there. And so much of it ... unreadable."

To be fair, I did see glimmers of a light dawning at the MLA.

For one, it's hard to fire off a gender j'accuse of "the patriarchy" when the audience is 70 percent female and racial rancor has waned under Obama. That left only "class" from the multicultural trinity. Sure enough, two of the panels I attended did feature Occupy rants against "the rich," "big corporations," and capitalism (from well-heeled academics agonizing over a system that forces them to receive princely salaries and perqs. And by the way, one of the MLA conference sponsors was ... Microsoft). Guilt rules.

The most valuable panel was composed of former MLA presidents arguing against the emphasis on non-fiction in the Common Core (the federal government's new set of K-12 academic standards) and the advent of "Rube Goldberg" teacher assessment based on measurable student "success" in everything from career and technical courses to philosophy and poetry. The student's participation in his/her learning has been subtracted from the new assessment equations.

MLA and the ACTC have one thing in common—alarm at the growing emphasis on what Juniata College's Wade Roberts (ACTC) called "the soft tyranny of instrumental and pragmatic education," i.e., job training, careerism, and specialization to the exclusion of developing a more finely tuned self. Edmundson rhetorically asks, "What professor would have the bad taste to puncture the walls of his students' privacy by asking them uncomfortable questions about ultimate values?"

Illustrating this common concern, Roberts's colleague James Roney discussed one of my favorite books, Evgeny Zamyatin's dystopian We. We depicts a society (for him, Russia, but today perhaps ours) determinedly stamping out everything individual and human in the name of order and efficiency. In The One State, people are numbered and genetically engineered into standardized units. They live in glass houses and are separated from Nature by "The Green Wall." Resistance is met with an operation to remove your imagination.

As T.S. Eliot framed it:

They constantly try to escape From the darkness outside and within By dreaming of systems so perfect that no one will need to be good.

But humans can't escape the darkness and remain human; each human needs to find the good alone but also discover that, as Isaiah Berlin held, goods do conflict and life is tragic.

Many aspects of life today have become disassociated from such a fundamentally human journey. Both outside the academy and within, a new false god proclaims that learning is immediate, observable, and measurable, that the human condition is solvable technologically, and that the way to happiness is to love Big Brother in his many disguises. The false god's creed is that "the unexamined life is well worth living."

Facing this Moloch, perhaps one day the ACTC, the MLA, and other humanistic organizations will join forces to fight for human uniqueness and individuality. That battle will require the ACTC's values and perspective married to the MLA's muscle, a marriage deferred until the ACTC gets a bigger microphone and the MLA suffers a few more reality checks.

In the predawn darkness, I ride along Rideau Canal toward the airport and listen as my Afghani refugee driver tells me about his children. What kind of education will they receive and what kind of world awaits them? Will it be liberty, imagination, and a great humanistic tradition? Or will it be dehumanization, Moloch, and The One State? Clearly, I have not completed the mission. The mission has barely begun.

Legislative Report to the MPC Board of Trustees-Tribley - May 15, 2013

Met with Bill Monning, Luis Alejo, and Mark Stone this month. Ms. Nakamura and I met with these elected officials and their staff to meet formally for the first time and to discuss issues of importance. Mr. Stone received a tour of the MPC Monterey Campus. We will meet with Mr. Farr at a later date.

AB 806 (Wilk) Salaries of Classroom Instructors

This bill would define "salaries of classroom instructors," commencing with the 2014-15 fiscal year, to include the salaries of counselors; instructional aide salaries, as defined; and the health and welfare benefits paid to specified personnel. The bill would also authorize the board of governors, commencing with the 2014-15 fiscal year, to establish a committee to review the auditing procedures in order to ensure compliance with the requirement that 50% of each district's current expense of education be paid for the salaries of classroom instructors. This bill is being heard on May 15 by the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 955 (Williams) Intersession Extension Programs

The bill would allow community colleges to offer extension programs for credit, during summer and winter intersessions, if the college has been at enrollment capacity for the preceding two years. Under AB 955, colleges could only offer courses leading to a certificate, degree, or transfer with fees based upon the district's approved nonresident fee level. As amended, the bill would require that 1/3rd of the revenues collected for the extension program be used to provide financial assistance in order to help provide access to extension courses for BOG fee waiver students.

Governor Brown's proposed policy changes in January 2013 regarding a 90-unit-cap for students and his census proposal have been withdrawn in the May revision of the Governor's Budget proposal.

MPC Active Bond/Facility Projects Update May 7, 2013

<u>Humanities</u> / Old Student Services / Business Humanities — The project is receiving State matching funds. Phase 1 (Old Student Services Building) construction has been completed. Construction on Phase 2 (Humanities Building) continues with completion scheduled for November of 2013. Electrical, mechanical and plumbing rough-in has been completed. Windows have been installed. Dry wall is being installed. The outside railings have been installed. Civil work has been completed, and the sidewalks are being poured.

<u>Life Science / Physical Science Buildings</u> – There are two phases in this project with the First Phase being the Life Science building which has been completed. At the Physical Science building, light fixtures have been installed. Epoxy lab floors are finished. Interior painting has been completed and lab case work is being installed. Floor coverings installation has begun. Electrical, mechanical and plumbing systems are almost completed, and testing will begin shortly. The Physical Science building is expected to be completed in the summer of 2013.

<u>Swing Space</u> – The "Swing Space Village" is located adjacent to and south of the Theatre, and classes are being conducted in the building. The General Classrooms Building has been modified and is accommodating the Physical Science department. Planning continues on Swing Space to accommodate the Student Center and the Arts Complex. A plan has been developed to accommodate food service, book store and other departments while the Student Center is under construction.

<u>Infrastructure</u> – Site work (lighting, parking lots, sidewalks) will be ongoing for the next few years.

<u>Pool/ Tennis Courts</u> – The project will go to bid in May 2013. It is anticipated work will commence in the summer of 2013.

<u>Student Center</u> – The project is out to bid, and bids are to be received May 30, 2013. Completion is scheduled for late summer of 2014.

<u>Arts Complex</u> – The Arts Complex project is comprised of the major renovation of the Art Studio and Art Ceramics Buildings and minor modifications to the Art Dimensional Building. This project is out to bid and bids are anticipated May 14, 2013. Construction will commence in the summer of 2013 with completion scheduled for the summer of 2014.

<u>Music Building</u> – MPC is applying for matching State funding for the renovation of some of the existing Music buildings.

<u>Facilities Committee</u> – The Committee meets on a regular basis to review project budgets and schedules. The next meeting is scheduled for May 31, 2013.

Summary: It is important to recognize that this is a State "match" funded project (State will fund \$3,318,000 and MPC will fund \$3,296,000). The original budget of \$3,845,000 that MPC was to contribute has now been reduced to \$3,296,000 due to the bids coming in lower than the budget. This results in a potential savings to the MPC bond budget of \$549,000 which may be allocated in the future to a contingency fund. Phase 1 (Old Student Services Building) has been completed. Phase 2 (Humanities Building) construction continues and is ahead of the contract construction schedule completion date of November 2013.
