I now know of the struggles women faced to make advancements in gender equality and how important they were to society and to me. Because of them I can be my own person; I can get a job and be successful and not be ostracized for it. I can be independent and not have to worry about basing my life around finding a husband who can support me monetarily. It truly is amazing.

I am more sensitive to how women are treated at my work place. I seem to catch myself monitoring how my coworkers interact with each other, both in formal and informal settings. My point here is it seems that I am applying what I have learned from this course to my daily observations.

HALLMARKS, HISTORY, AND INSTITUTIONAL DISTINCTIONS OF GWOS AT MPC

Hallmarks

- Research shows that the presence of Gender and Women's Studies contributes to improved gender equity on college campuses and improves campus climates for women and LGBTQ students. GWOS incumbent Title IX expert.
- GWOS at MPC uniquely serves the college providing targeted programming and faculty service to the institution, which directly contributes to Ed Code diversity mandates. For 2015-16 GWOS coordinated five special events open to campus community and public.
- Student Development Research shows student retention rates are improved when students participate in identity based resource centers & extra-curricular programming and community-building; in addition to its educational mission, GWOS provides support and extra-curricular benefits impacting student retention.
- In Spring 2016 GWOS initiates community internship partnerships between GWOS students and regional organizations and businesses, furthering MPC mandate to serve Monterey Peninsula community.
- GWOS collaborates across disciplines to provide curriculum, improve student support, enhance STEM initiatives at MPC, sponsor extracurricular programming.

History

- Women's Studies has a proud and distinguished history on the Monterey Peninsula.
- The MPC Women's Studies mission galvanized financial support from individuals and the Community Foundation for Monterey County. In 2011, this fund "Women Helping Women" was transferred to the MPC Foundation.
- Prior to 2009, Women's Studies provided direct student support services: students food resources on campus, free textbook program, free clothing, and career coaching.
- In 2011 Supervisor Garrison and a Search Committee selected current GWOS incumbent for a replacement position, but later cancelled the position due to budgetary declines in the state.
- 2011-2014 The Women's Studies Dept. remained without a full time faculty position!!
- In 2014 The Baskin Foundation awarded a 3 year grant for the purpose of supporting a sustainable Gender and Women's Studies Department, by funding a full time faculty position.

Institutional Distinctions

- Represents a partnership between MPC and the Peggy & Jack Baskin Foundation.
- Successful recruitment in 2014 of the GWOS incumbent resulted in external funding for the college, specific to the Baskin Foundation's targeted interest in promoting Gender and Women's Studies education and a sustainable GWOS Department at MPC.
- GWOS incumbent effectively met grant targets for grant years 1 & 2 resulting in continued annual funding grant years 2 & 3.
- However, grant year 3 expires June 30 2016.
- Obtaining funding for grant years 4 & 5 requires the GWOS position be tenure track in advance of reapplication to Baskin Foundation by the MPC Foundation.
- Therefore, Social Sciences requesting the position be reclassified to tenure track in order to secure Baskin funding for academic years 2017-19 and sustain Baskin partnership

LGBTQ DIVERSITY:

It's critical to note that GWOS is the only department on campus that offers standard curriculum that explicitly addresses sexual and gender diversity as a fundamental aspect of all course work; thereby providing significant student support service to LGBTQ students at MPC. LGBTQ youth are one of the highest groups representing youth at risk for suicide and depression. Gender and Women's Studies and the Gender Studies Club provide critically important interventions in student support at MPC with respect to supporting this significantly under-served demographic group.

Interdisciplinary scope


- Uses methods and research from across the disciplines
