Faculty Handbook for Online Instruction

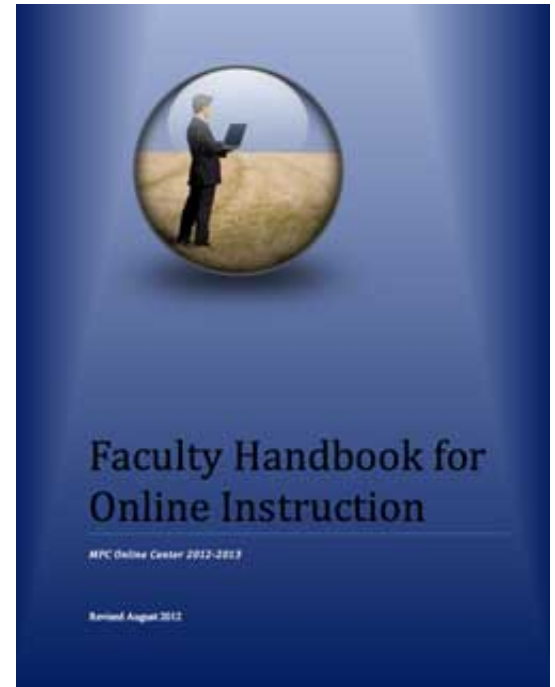
The *Faculty Handbook for Online Instruction* provides important information about teaching with online tools at MPC.

Moodle Tool Guide for Faculty

The *Moodle Tool Guide for Faculty* provides an excellent overview of the different tools and activities available in Moodle.

The *Guide* is laid out in a grid designed to show the strengths and weaknesses of each tool in terms of the pedagogical goals it can help you achieve.

Tools/activities form one axis of the grid, and pedagogical goals form the other. As you move across the grid for each tool, you can see the ease of use of each tool and the types of pedagogical goals that the tool supports:

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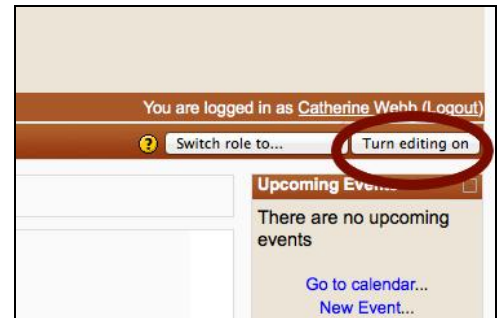
Activating Your MPC Online Course

Once you have developed your course, how do you make sure it is visible to your students? Follow the steps below to activate your course and course content.

Step One: Turn editing on

Log into MPC Online and access your course.

In the upper lefthand corner of the screen, look for the "Turn editing on" button. Click this button to enable course editing.



Step Two: Access your Course Settings

Look for your course's Administration block. In the example shown below, the Administration block is on the left of the course page. (Your Administration block may be in a different spot, depending on your course's layout.)

In the Administration block, select "Settings" to access the "Edit course settings" page. It should be the second option in the block.



Step Three: Set your Course Availability

You should now be at the "Edit Course Settings" page for your course. Scroll down the page until you reach the section labeled "Availability."

Look at the availability setting. If the setting reads: "This course is not available to students," the course is invisible. To activate your course and make it visible to students, select "This course is available to students" from the availability pull down menu, as shown in the image below.



Step Four: Save your changes

Scroll down to the bottom of the "Edit course settings" page, and click the "Save changes" button to save your work. Your course should now be visible to students.

Moodle allows you to upload your own documents, images, and other files for inclusion in your course. Sometimes, you may wish to share a set of these files with your students—for example, a folder of documents or readings for the lesson at hand.

@One typically offers one webinar per week. Webinars all begin at 12pm Pacific, and are delivered via CCC Confer.

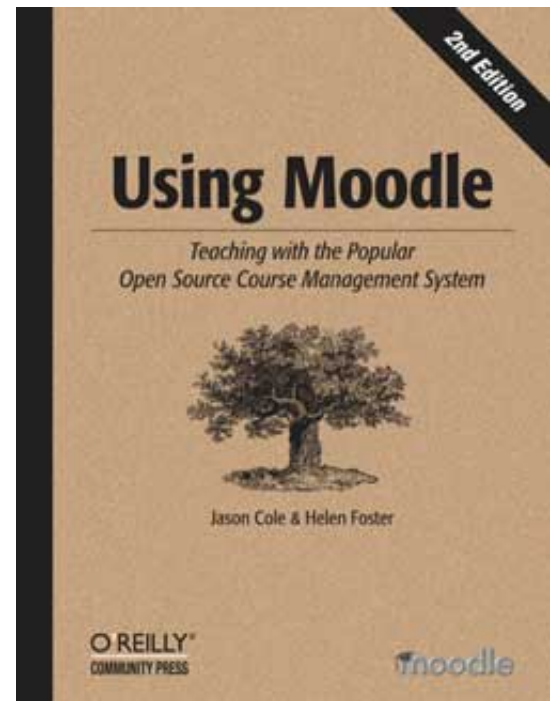
