

The Marine Advanced Technology Education (MATE) Center, the National Science Foundation, and the Marine Technology Society's (MTS) ROV Committee invite you to our 13th Annual International Student ROV Competition.

Sixty teams representing middle schools, high schools, home schools, after-school groups, community colleges, and universities from 18 different states and 13 different countries are scheduled to compete in this year's event, which is being held June 26-28, 2014 at the Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary (TBNMS) in Alpena, MI, USA.

This year's contest focuses on shipwrecks, science, and conservation in our National Marine Sanctuaries. Students will pilot their ROVs to explore and document an unknown shipwreck, collect scientific samples, inventory invasive species, and remove trash and debris, among other tasks – all staged in the 80-foot diameter, 600,000 gallon tank at the TBNMS facility.

Each year the competition challenges students to think of themselves as "entrepreneurs." Students are asked to form companies that design, build, and market their "product" as a way to gain a better understanding the breadth of real-world business operations. Along the way, they learn how to manage a project, work as a team, think creatively, and problem-solve, which are all important 21st century workplace skills.

During the event, a panel of judges – professionals representing industry, science, government, education, and exploration – will evaluate the companies on their ability to effectively communicate their vehicles' design and construction via technical reports, poster displays, and engineering evaluation interviews.

The competition will also feature the Ocean Career Expo, organized by the MATE Center and its partners in the Centers for Ocean Sciences Education Excellence (COSEE).

YOUTH FUND GRANT GUIDELINES AND APPLICATION FORM

INTRODUCTION

The Monterey Peninsula Foundation is a nonprofit organization that hosts the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am golf tournament in Pebble Beach, California and distributes the tournament's proceeds to the community through our grant programs. Since 1937, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation has focused on making a significant contribution to the community.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR GRANT SEEKERS

- 1. *Applications for 2015 Youth Fund Grants are due to the Youth Fund Grant liaison at your college by July 1, 2014. MPC's Youth Fund Grant liaison is Shawn Anderson, Executive Assistant to MPC's Superintendent/President, Dr. Walt Tribley.
- 2. The Youth Fund Grant Committee meets in April, August and November to review applications and make funding decisions.
- 3. Since applicants should expect up to 60-90 days <u>after</u> submitting an application for determination of any funding, applications should be submitted a <u>minimum</u> of 60 days before an applicant hopes a grant application will be reviewed by the Youth Fund Grant Committee.
- 4. Applicants should make every effort to ensure their application is complete only complete applications from eligible organizations will be considered for funding.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

The Monterey Peninsula Foundation Youth Fund is a youth-oriented fund formerly known as the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am Youth Fund. The Foundation's principal source of funds is the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, and the Youth Fund has awarded grants to selected youth-oriented organizations in Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito counties since 1954. Approximately 60-70 grants are awarded each year averaging about \$7,500 each; grants range from \$1,000 – 10,000; please note the maximum request amount is \$10,000. Grant applicants must be a tax-exempt, 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organizations as determined by the Internal Revenue Service, or schools. The Youth Fund does not award grants to individuals or for salaries for teachers or school employees. The Youth Fund also requires that organizations submit a completed Grant Outcome Evaluation Report for a grant previously awarded by the Youth Fund or Foundation before a new grant application will be considered. *Grant Outcome Evaluation Reports are due on the date established by your college.

• Nonprofit organizations can apply once in a twelve-month period to <u>either</u> the Youth Fund or the Foundation for a grant, with the exception of public and private schools, colleges and universities

- Public and private schools serving K-12 can apply more than once per year to the Youth Fund
- In general, schools within the same school district cannot be considered for a Youth Fund grant for the same external program
- Colleges and universities may apply separately to the Monterey Peninsula Foundation and the Youth Fund

GRANT APPLICATION TIMING/PROCESS

*Although the Youth Fund Grant Committee reviews grant applications throughout the year, you must meet the application deadlines established by your college. *Applications for 2015 Youth Fund Grants are due to Shawn Anderson, MPC's Executive Assistant to the Superintendent/President, by July 1, 2014. While the Youth Fund only awards grants to nonprofit organizations or schools, we do not request or need copies of the applicant's 501(c)(3) ruling from the IRS that confirms nonprofit status; the Foundation staff confirms the nonprofit status of applicants through its due diligence process.

After a complete (all submitted materials are current and complete according to the directions) grant application is received, the Foundation's Youth Fund Grant Committee considers all applications scheduled for review. Staff may conduct site visits with the applicants or call the applicants with questions. A site visit or call by staff does not guarantee funding approval. If a grant application does not meet the criteria of the Youth Fund, the applicant will be notified immediately. Since applicants should expect up to 60-90 days after submitting an application for determination of any funding, applications should be submitted a minimum of 60 days before an applicant hopes a grant application will be reviewed by the Youth Fund Grant Committee.

SCOPE AND TYPES OF GRANTS

Geographic Funding Areas: Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties in California. Types of Grants: the Youth Fund will consider funding requests for the following:

- Special programs at public and charter schools that serve grades K-12
- School equipment for needy youth at private schools that serve grades K-12
- Special programs and/or supplies for youth organizations
- Team uniforms and equipment for boys and girls (K-12) athletic teams (i.e. at schools, or Little League, Pop Warner Football league, etc.)
- Scholarships or financial aid for Monterey County Community Colleges and four-year universities, and limited scholarships for needy students at the K-12 level
- Equipment and supplies for organizations that support mentally and physically challenged children
- Drug or alcohol counseling for youth
- Music and art programs for youth (including youth symphony concerts, youth music festivals, youth theater groups, musical performances geared towards youth, and art classes for youth)
- Instruments, uniforms, and equipment for youth orchestras and bands
- General youth programs
- Early childhood education programs
- Sober Grad Night events (organized by school or PTA)

The Youth Fund does not support salaries for teachers or school employees.

A World Cup wish: Salinas teen wins trip

Make-A-Wish grants birthday gift to Ruben Rubio-Reyes By Tom Leyde

Ruben Rubio-Reyes is celebrating his 19th birthday by fulfilling a lifelong dream. He is going to the World Cup in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and it isn't costing him a dime.

The Salinas teenager was given the trip through Make-A-Wish Greater Bay Area, which grants requests by young people battling diseases.

Rubio-Reyes, who has leukemia, made his wish a year ago and found out in November that it had been granted.

"It's a pretty awesome birthday gift, actually," he said Thursday.

The 2013 Alvarez High School graduate was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia when he was 15. The diagnosis hit him hard. He was playing soccer for Alvarez and had to stop all physical activity while undergoing treatment.

"I was way younger and didn't have much understanding of why" it was happening, he said.

"I was in a state of depression for a while. Waking up sick every day, it did get me down for a while . . . I was pretty bummed out in the beginning."

Through chemotherapy, blood transfusions, lumbar punctures and lots of prayers and support, Rubio-Reyes has all but beaten the disease in three years. He has been in remission for 20 months and has five more months of weekly chemotherapy treatments to go. "So I'm kind of almost done," he said.

His successful treatment allowed him to attend Monterey Peninsula College, where this year he completed training to become an emergency medical technician. He has one more test to pass before he can obtain his national registry card, apply for an EMT card, then seek employment.

Rubio-Reyes plans to work as an EMT for a time and continue in the medical field. He hasn't decided what else he will pursue but is considering nursing.

He spent Thursday watching the opening game of the World Cup on TV. Brazil defeated Croatia 3-1.

"They're (Brazil) like the big powerhouse in soccer," he said. "It's (the World Cup) every four years, so I anxiously await it. It's a pretty big event."

The trip will mark Rubio-Reyes's first international journey. Traveling with him will be his father, Ruben Rubio-Tirado, a machine operator for Taylor Farms.

"It's been his dream ever since he was a little boy and now he's able to do it." Rubio-Tirado said.

He said his mother, Carolina Reyes, also a Taylor Farms employee, is happy about the trip.

"She's pretty excited for me," he said. "She really wants me to have fun."

He credits his mother as being his biggest supporter through his illness.

"My mom, she's been like helping me with everything that goes on. If I need something, she's always there."

The son and father will attend two World Cup games: Iran vs. Nigeria on Monday and Honduras vs. Ecuador on Friday, both at the World Cup Stadium in Curitiba. They also will visit the FIFA Fan Fest, go on a sightseeing tour and participate in other activities.

Ruben-Reyes said he's rooting for Honduras but doesn't have a favorite in the Iran-Nigeria match.

Make-A-Wish Greater Bay Area, which is celebrating its 30th year, grants more than 300 wishes annually, with more than 6,000 to date. It is one of the largest chapters in the United States, and its territory includes 17 Northern California counties, including Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito.

Ruben-Reyes is among nearly 40 individuals from throughout the U.S. granted a trip to the World Cup by Make-A-Wish chapters. He is grateful for the opportunity.

"Everyone I know has made great efforts to be there for me throughout my illness," he said. "But in receiving a wish, I feel like I am giving them a little something positive to look forward to as well."

Former Seaside High player gets chance to teach at camp By John Devine

The energy, enthusiasm and emotion. It wasn't an act.

That's how Kordell Reed learned the game as a camper over the past 10 years at the Johnson-Toney Football Camp.

The constant encouragement by the recent Seaside High graduate — turned camp coach — got contagious on the Monterey Peninsula College football field Monday.

"It's coming from the heart," said Reed, now a freshman receiver at MPC. "I want to give something back. This camp has been a part of my summer for 10 years."

Reed is not the only former camper turned coach at the annual four-day event, formerly known as the Herm Edwards Football Camp.

Yet, Reed was clearly on an adrenaline rush, bouncing around as kids gravitated toward his energy on the plush synthetic surface at MPC.

More than 400 kids ages 7-17 were at Monday's opening day, all of them wearing gray shirts and shorts. They all also seemed eager to learn the game,

"This camp shaped me into the athlete I am today," Reed said. "It gave knowledge that I would not have found anywhere else. It gave me values — values that I carry with me today."

Reed made an effort to single out each kid he was working with, either vocally or with high fives and chest bumps.

With it came big smiles from campers catching passes or doing drills. Reed was teaching the game, yet with a mannerism that got the attention of coordinator Ron Johnson.

"Did you see Kordell over there?" said Johnson, a former Eagles receiver who has been a part of the camp since its inception. "We want the camp to go beyond the game."

Johnson, who speaks softly, could be heard over the wind as he spoke to the group before breaking them into teams based on age.

"Learning to become a leader is learning to follow," Johnson said. "We have kids from as far south as Greenfield here today. Make a friend or two, work as a team and make good decisions."

Reed has become one of those leaders. His dream is still alive as he will play college football. He never forgot the tutelage or wisdom he received as a camper.

"You drop a pass, so what?" Evans said. "We will learn to catch it. This camp is about teaching in a positive environment. Encouragement is important. So is having fun. I'm having a blast."

So was Reed's former Seaside teammate Chris Evans, who was The Herald's Player of the Year this past season in basketball.

"Without this camp, my life may have gone in a different direction," Evans said. "I met a lot of my friends here. I learned the game. The lessons I learned, I've taken and utilized in my life."

Some of that included football for the former quarterback/defensive back.

While basketball is the sport Evans is leaning toward playing this season at MPC, he was on the field, teaching kids how to throw passes, an art he learned through the camp.

"What this camp showed me was how to play as a team with kids from all walks of life," Evans said. "I wanted to pass along the leadership skills it provided me."

Evans, 18, was 7 years old when he took part in his first camp. Four of his closest friends he met at the camp are now all working together as coaches.

"What we're seeing is campers coming back to coach," Johnson said. "It adds credibility to what we are trying to teach, understanding the importance of wanting to give back to your community."

While the camp's reputation includes a sprinkling of players currently in the NFL, Johnson looks at those that return as the ones providing a glimpse of the future.

"I think it shows that what we're trying to teach at this camp still works," Johnson said. "It is not just about football. It never has been. Football can be a tool to teach life lessons. You have to be credible on the field and in life."

Football camp instruction priceless for kids

I keep hearing it's a football camp held primarily to expose kids to the game in a playful manner, in a positive environment, without the physical prowess.

That's true. There were close to 500 kids running around this week at the Johnson-Toney Football Camp that have not hit their teenage years.

But it doesn't mean the learning curve stops as you get older. That was evident in the afternoon when 50-plus high school players showed up to pick up a tip or two without it costing them a dime.

The camp has always been about using football as a forum to apply in life, building character while learning to respect the stranger from another school on the field next to you. But the instruction provided by a cast of coaches is priceless.

This is a camp which current Tampa Bay linebacker Mason Foster and Bears rookie quarterback David Fales participated in as high school athletes. It also sees numerous former participants return to help run a camp that obviously left an impression in their lives.

No, you're not going to see college recruiters hanging around the camp. That's never been what this event has been about. But that hasn't kept hundreds of former campers from playing college football.

Egos are left behind before players walk onto the field. What's wrong with learning the game and having fun at the same time? And no one is too old to pick up a pointer or two.

This is a free, four-day camp — in most kids' backyard, on the plush grounds of Monterey Peninsula College.

You're not cramming to learn a playbook. Instead, simple subjects like footwork for a quarterback, or when to cut on your route and proper position for a lineman are being taught.

Don't get me wrong. It's competitive. Just watch the 7-on-7 scrimmages.

With the high school players' portion of the camp being separate from the younger kids, it's given them more of a pro-like experience.

The values of the camp haven't changed. Yet, giving the high school players their own forum has given them a bigger stage to enhance their skills while not sacrificing any time to the prep players of tomorrow.

This is one of the best things going on in Monterey County, started some 20-plus years ago by a cast of local players in the NFL.

Two of the holdovers from that initial camp in the late 1980s are Ron Johnson and Anthony Toney. It seems fitting that their names are now tagged to it.

Both played for the Philadelphia Eagles along with Herm Edwards, who made this camp something special before handing the keys to Johnson and Toney four years ago.

Johnson is quiet and unassuming. Toney never liked the limelight, even when he was winning Central Coast Section 400-meter titles at North Salinas or blowing up a defender with a block on "Monday Night Football."

Humility works at all levels. It's the perfect remedy for a camp that exposes some kids to the game for the first time as well as adding another wrinkle to an experienced player's armor.

There was talk a few years back of limiting the number of campers. Not happening. No one is ever going to get turned away.

This camp has become a summer highlight for some kids. Friends are made. Values are gained. While the younger kids are in awe, the older ones are putting family vacations on hold.

The formula works.

Too often athletes who reach the pinnacle of playing professional sports forget their roots, where they got their start, who helped provide them a link.

Johnson and Toney are throwbacks — 20-plus years removed from the game — yet they still provide values during the four-day camp that last a lifetime.

In spite of cuts, MPC still deficit spending

Even after \$1.8 million in cuts, college still deficit spending By Claudia Meléndez Salinas

In spite of financial cuts throughout Monterey Peninsula College last year, administrators are still at least a year away from closing the school's budget gap.

Administrators were able to cut \$1.8 million in an attempt to bridge a \$2.5 million structural deficit. The cuts were achieved through retirement incentives, the layoff of five and a half full-time equivalent employees — including technicians from the theater department, and the restructuring of the tutoring center.

But MPC also saw an increase of \$1 million in expenses — some through contractual increases for staff. Thus, the net reduction of the structural deficit is about \$700,000, said C. Earl Davis, interim vice president of administrative services.

Which means that administrators are still looking to cut \$1.8 million for the 2015-16 budget. This year, the gap is being filled by borrowing from the college's self-insurance fund.

"The board has made it clear to the president of the college that a year from now when we propose a tentative budget, they expect us to do so without any structural deficit," Davis said. "We'll continue to negotiate, we'll continue to look at various categories of expenses the college has and do the necessary repositioning so the college expenses are supported by ongoing college revenues."

And the college's largest expenses come from salaries and benefits.

Mark Clements, outgoing president of the MPC Faculty Association, said the teachers had already agreed in principle on some medical benefits cuts that would have saved the college \$500,000, but that some miscommunication along the way tainted the process and the teachers backpedaled. If there are to be concessions from the teachers they're most likely to come from benefits, he said.

But teachers also want more money.

"We're looking at savings in benefits, but we're also looking for a salary increase," he said. "We have not had an increase since 2007. We're being asked for larger teaching loads, but still we have not had a salary increase. Seventeen faculty have left in the last five years, we can't get

faculty to come to MPC because the cost of living is too high and the pay too low. Salary is a big issue."

College President Walter Tribley is also negotiating with the unions to restructure the Early Childhood Education program into a "lab school." Instead of employing four full-time teachers and four part-time teachers, the lab would employ two full-time "lab managers," playground assistants, and presumably, students who would need experience and would get it with the internship.

The Early Childhood Education Program will remain as is for the upcoming year, with the intention of moving into the new model on July 1, 2015, Tribley said.

"The new lab school will allow the district to scale up our Early Childhood Education Program and double the number of children we care for in the center," Tribley wrote in an email. "The lab school will be financially sustainable and scaleable."

MPC has not recovered from California's financial downturn and a series of legislative changes that affected its bottom line. Rules for the California community colleges have changed to put an emphasis on training for college and careers, which leaves out life enrichment classes, now no longer subsidized by the state. Life-long learners comprised about 24 percent of MPC full-time equivalent students in 2009.

Administrators had avoided deep cuts since then by using one-time funds to cover ongoing expenses. Trustees have signaled their desire to eliminate deficit spending as soon as possible.

"We know we can get out of this budget problem if we get more students, that's our big push," said Board President Charles Brown. MPC President Walter Tribley "is doing a great job of trying to manage the budget, he's only been here for one and a half years. The college itself, the faculty, the classified, they're tightening their belts as much they can. Hopefully we'll meet (the target) in the next year. Dr. Tribley is trying to get a formula to cut across the board evenly, but our expectation is to have it close enough to be balanced by next year."
