Course Description: This course examines the interaction of language with society and the individual and how language establishes power, ethnicity, gender, and social identity. Students are also introduced to linguistic diversity in US society today and methodology for sociolinguistic analysis of conversations. Also offered as Ethnic Studies 45; credit may be earned only once.

GRADING:

This course awards letter grades (LG) unless you opt to receive a Credit/No Credit (CR/NC) grade. Discuss this option with a counselor if you are considering it. *(There are 16 Forums during the semester. Complete all 16 to receive full credit [10%]. For each forum missed, 1.5% will be deducted from the final grade.)
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Quizzes = 70% of the total grade Final Project = 20% of the total grade
